From the President's Desk

Hello everyone,

2007 will mark the twenty-fifth anniversary of the Red Knights and the anniversary convention will be held in Massachusetts. With that in mind a call went out to all the Massachusetts chapters to help in planning that year's convention. Our chapter has also taken on hosting and co-hosting past conventions, drawing members from around the continent into our home state.

It is also important to recognize that there has been much work and commitment over the past two decades that has helped produce the organization that we enjoy today. The convention that just concluded had 120 members and 30 chapters in attendance. 

Please remember that we must have our roster complete and mailed in to the International before the end of February. Help us make that deadline (so we are not charged a service fee) by having your dues to Tim before the beginning of the New Year. *Thank you!*

Remember to give your ride some TLC before storing her away for the winter. A little time spent now will help your bike be ready for its first ride in the spring.

Things to do include changing your oil and fill your gas tank adding a fuel additive like "Sta-bil" in the tank. Keep the battery cared for all winter. Put a coat of wax on the bike for protection. Check your coolant level and condition, and also take some precautions against any mice that may try to find a winter home in your ride

Don't let your mind-set for riding go stale in the winter either. We all go through PMS (Parked Motorcycle Syndrome), so keep your mind sharp by reading about bikes... where to ride, rider education tips, what's new in accessories, etc.



Of course... if Red Knight "A" jumped off the bridge, then Red Knight "B" is sure to follow. Some one has to be there to rescue Red Knight "A"!

2005 Convention – Toronto – A recap of RK Affairs!



Sixteen bikes and nearly 30 people showed up for our August Ice Cream Ride to Sterling Ice Cream!



February Pot-Luck

Do you ride when the weather is *cold*? Well, first we probably need to define cold since it is a relative term. Some people may think that temperatures below 70 degrees are cold while others may scoff at near freezing temperatures. When I had my first bike, it had to be at least 50 degrees and absolutely no chance of rain – but now, a little rain and a little cold never hurt anyone! Here are some excerpts from a couple of pertinent articles that were in American Motorcyclist Magazine this year.

Any Weather, Any Time - Nov. 2005

It doesn't get much better than fall riding – colorful leaves, clear air, and a kind of scenery that you'll remember all winter.

Done right a fall ride can be just about perfect. But this time of year brings a few challenges you need to take into account when you head out on your bike.

In many parts of the country (ours included), it's not uncommon to see temperature swings of 20 degrees or more from morning to afternoon. That may not matter much when the highs and lows at 80 and 60, but it can make an enormous difference when the numbers are 60 and 40.

A little planning is all you need to continue enjoying the season. Here's a simple, three-step program that will help you get the most out of fall.

STEP ONE Preserve Body Heat. Remember that the human body is a pretty good source of heat. So as the temperature drops, your first priority should be to preserve as much of that heat as possible.

Think Layers. It's not just the clothes you wear that keeps you warm, it's the air trapped inside too. That's one reason to wear a few layers rather than one heavy one. Layering also let's you "fine tune" your comfort level in variable temperatures.

Build a Base. The stuff you wear next to your skin is the base. Synthetics like polyester wick away perspiration to give you more warmth than cotton which may stay damp from your perspiration.

<u>Get Fleeced</u>. You need a light insulating layer that fits comfortably inside your riding jacket.

Get dressed inside. If it's chilly in your garage or the parking lot, be sure to put on most of your gear indoors to retain some of the indoor heat.

Have a glove strategy. Your hands are the most important interface between you and your bike. When they get cold, your ability to operate the bike safely is compromised.

<u>Cover your head</u>. Consider wearing a balacava – a thin head-and-face covering that allows only your eyes to

Crash Course – February 2005

Returning to Virginia from Bike Week about a dozen years ago, I got into the Carolinas and noticed the temperature dropping. Outside of Fayetteville, North Carolina, I stopped for gas.

Signing the gas receipt, my scribble was even more illegible than normal. When I tried to explain this aberration to the attendant, I could hardly think what to say, and my words were barely understandable.

Way back in the recesses of my brain,

one not-yet-numb cell yelled out, "HYPOTHERMIA!"

After a bowl of chili and many cups of hot chocolate, I stuffed the Fayetteville Gazette between my jacket and chest and rode to the first available motel.

Three tubs of hot water later, life returned to normal, and I remained in the gene pool.

The lesson is simple: When the warning signs show up, heed them.

The temperatures do not have to be excessively cold to cause hypothermia. Wind helps reduce the body temperature more quickly as does moisture — two conditions that we see while riding. Some of the warning signs of hypothermia include:

- shivering/exhaustion
- confusion/fumbling hands
- memory loss/slurred speech
- drowsiness / reduced energy

show. Sure you look funny, but you'll be warmer.

Wear a full-face helmet. A full-face will keep you warmer than an open-faced lid.

STEP TWO Block the Wind. You need to prevent the wind from getting in.

Stop it cold. Make sure that your outer later is wind proof. Leather is good for this as is some of the high-tech fabrics – and so is your rain suit.

<u>Don't stick your neck out</u>. Even a simple bandana can help keep the heat loss down at your neck.

<u>Don't forget the bike</u>. A fearing, even a small one, can make a tremendous difference in cooler weather. No fearing? Even a well-packed tank bag can help in blocking the wind.

STEP THREE Add Heat. Electric clothing, hand warmers, and heated bikes (like BMW's heated hand grips or a after market heated seat) all offer additional warmth for the rider.

So there you have it: A strategy to help deal with fall's variable weather. These tips could even extend your fall

Medical Motorcycling – September 2005

In a recent MCN article on first aid "Flash Gordon, MD" gave his opinions on what you should carry for First Aid supplies on your bike. Here's a cut down version:

<u>Gas Station Bathroom</u>. Wash your injuries out (with soap when possible) to sanitize them.

<u>Band-Aids</u>. Consider buying flexible and waterproof *adhesive bandages*.

<u>Buttefly Closures</u>. ...to hold your wounds together.

<u>Benzoil Swabs</u>. Helps the adhesive bandages stick to the skin.

<u>Disinfectant</u>. Carry a small bottle of Betadine. <u>Elastic Bandage</u>. Ace bandage is one brand, and they are useful for wrapping sprains, holding ice packs in place, etc.

<u>Bandaging Material</u>. Including 4 X 4's, Combine Dressings, Non-stick Gauze, and roller gauze (Tape too).

Goop. Antibiotic ointment.

Cold Packs.

<u>Miscellaneous items</u>. Tweezers, Wire Splint, Triangular Bandages, and a Space Blanket.


