

On the road with our friends...

- RK Vermont-2 11th annual Paul's Ride. We had ten of our members head across the border to support Vermont 2's endeavors. It was a beautiful summer's day for a ride, which brought out over 70 riders for a very successful ride to raise money to supply cancer patients with gas cards. The ride is in memory of Dave Emery's brother Paul. We had a successful day too... Tim won the 50/50 raffle and each one of our members took home at least one door prize (19 total). Dave started off the raffle saying that Mass-2 should just come up and take the prizes we wanted! Always a great time, and we even skirted an afternoon shower during our detour to Bernardston for ice cream after the event.
- It was HOT (97 degrees) on July 14 when we headed to Springfield, Vermont to visit the Moving Vietnam Wall while it was touring the northeast. We had eleven in our contingent that headed to the Green Mountain State. We passed a marshalling point for a large group of riders just south of the city. When we arrived to the site where The Wall was on display we learned that group of riders were part of the procession and ceremony for the event. We were asked if we wished to ride in the procession, but we decided to be spectators instead.
- A dozen riders came out for the all-day ride into the White Mountains with a stop at the Castle-in-the-Clouds. Our summer was hot with the chance of showers pretty much every day and this day was no different. The group made most of the 260 miles dry with dampness beginning only after crossing back into Massachusetts.
- Mother Nature was scowling at us again on a day we had planned to ride to Quechee, Vermont, so we opted for "Plan B" when 12 of us went for a local ride that stopped at Parker's Sugar House in Brookline, NH. With full tummies we were back home by noon with the bikes tucked away before the day's thunderstorm started rumbling.
- We had a great August ride into Rhode Island to find their only covered bridge — which happens also to be the smallest one in the country! We were on the road with 19 members and friends, stopped for lunch at Wright's Chicken Farm, and ice cream back in Sterling. It was a fun day!
- 90% sunshine, 10% rain (on the ride up) on another great Labor Day weekend BBQ at the Mickles. About 30 family, friends, and Red Knights had a great afternoon full of food and fun!
- A weekend ride into Sommerville, MA for chocolate was the original plan — but a last minute change pushed the direction of travel into southern Vermont for a Sunday ride in September for our RK group... complete with some chocolates at the VT country store!



Our monthly ice cream rides have drawn to a close—as most of the ice cream stands have closed for the season.

But throughout the summer we continued to have great turn outs for ice cream! In July we had 19 people come out and we made our way to Still-4-Corners in Rutland on a picture-perfect summer's evening for some great ice cream.

In August, the chapter bought the ice cream and we met at Larry and Nancy's to "top" the ice cream — all 27 of us — and play some bocce!



Our final ice cream ride was on a damp and cool evening, but we still had nine members come out for a brief ride to Phillipston for our treat!

We had a spectacular day for this year's Ride for Kids. As always we had a good turn out of our chapter with eleven members coming out for the ride and post-ride events.

This year our chapter brought in \$3,656 and the ride total was \$55,881. WOW on both accounts! Mass-2 was recognized as the third highest club figure — thank you everyone! They told us that since 1984 \$67 million in donations have been brought in by motorcyclists to the Ride for Kids.

We were greeted by the Sturbridge FD ladder flying Old Glory as we pulled into the marshalling point, and our route was guided by officers from five police departments from Central Mass. As we passed through each town there were fire engines and firefighters outside the stations as we passed. That was a great sight to see as well!

Dr. Peter Manly of Dana-Farber spoke to us after the ride on how important our contributions are to the ongoing research efforts. He stated that one in every 600 adults is a pediatric cancer survivor and that is a direct relation to the research being done. He stated that when someone is now diagnosed with a pediatric brain tumor their prognosis is now we ARE going to beat this.

Speaking of survivors, we got to see Ryan again this year. We first met him in 1999 when he was just a few months old and diagnosed with a brain tumor. His prognosis was very poor. But this fall he enters seventh grade and the doctors say that his maturing body is actually suffocating his tumor!



That is why we support this ride each year. Start asking for donations now for next year and we will be part of the difference that the research is making. See you in 2013!



A big THANK YOU goes out to the Olivers and the New Salem General Store for their donation of the Jack Daniels barrel and coordinating a Ride for Kids raffle for us.

This year the tickets sold for the signed JD Barrel added over \$600 to our total donations for the Ride for Kids!

The officers made arrangements for a local massage therapist to spend the afternoon with us. She ran constant with her chair working on Red Knight backs for three and a half hours! She was pleased that everyone who wanted to have some time in her chair got the opportunity. We also raffled off a full hour massage with Jen to benefit the Ride for Kids. How was the massage Shaky?

Our crowd hung around too and enjoyed the summer afternoon and the hospitality of the Robinsons until almost 6:00 p.m. It was a great day!



Here is some data from the annual report from the Pediatric Brain Tumor Foundation:

Forty Ride for Kids events across the United States brought in over \$4.4 million in donations. There were 15,500 ride participants and 312 patient families. The rides are managed by a group of 2,500 volunteers.

Financially, the Ride for Kids brought in over 80% of the funds used by the PBTFUS for their efforts. 85 cents of every dollar donated goes to the direct mission of research and support done by the PBTFUS.

153 college scholarships were awarded to survivors of pediatric brain tumors last year—bringing the total scholarship awards to over 1,000 in the past ten years. (A remarkable number when you think that when the Ride for Kids was founded a diagnosis of a brain tumor was a near-certain death sentence for a child).

THE PBTFUS continues to be the largest non-governmental funding source for the research into a cure for pediatric brain tumors.

Congratulations to Ed and Peg & Maury and Marcia on the deliveries of their new 2012 Goldwings this summer. Thank you to Kevin Martin for his thirty years of emergency services as he begins his retirement from the Ashburnham Fire Department (and begins his career as a *rookie* on Lunenburg FD!)

Welcome to Lou Merigard — an exchange student from Paris, spending the next year with the Kilharts. We look forward to seeing you at some of our events! The Red Knights are known world-wide, as Lou's mom had heard of the group and granted permission for her to spend some time in the pillion seat on Tim's bike!

Here are some comments we have received from recent MSF Scholarship recipients. All those that we have heard from since we started the program have been very grateful for the opportunity to take the training. (We have given out over 40 scholarships total!)

- The class provided review of nice-to-have skills as well as potentially life-saving skills. The nice-to-haves included U-turns within a defined area and travelling at a slow speed, among others. The life-saving skills included cornering, swerving and quick stops.
- The quick stops exercise highlighted the criticality of using both brakes with gradual but firm grasp of the front brake. This was proven first hand when a class mate lost control of his bike applying too much front brake during a quick stop on a damp course. I took away a better understanding of what my vulnerabilities are and what I can and should work on.
- We started off the day riding in the rain. At the very least when we arrived the rain had stopped and then we were on our way. The course was a lot of fun but far from easy with the bigger bikes. I can say I am glad we have done training in the past with MA 2 which helped.
- The class provided me the opportunity to work on skills that we do not use every day and that can be quite beneficial to our road safety, as well as improved riding awareness. In particular for me I identified that in coming to quick hard stops in a corner; I was leaning the bike as opposed to getting it up straight prior to attempting a stop, and thus could have been prone to high siding. In my opinion the class helped identify those weaknesses we each carry and provide an independent feedback and opportunity to improve.
- I feel I learned a lot of useful information on how to safely operate my motorcycle and feel more confident in my operating skills. Thank you again and look forward to seeing you on the road.
- The drills that we ran through were fast paced and interesting. The crotch rockets all had larger turning a radius than the others. The rookie with the 1000 ninja had trouble in the turns it just wanted to go. Finally our instructor told us there would be a test. He said it was nothing more than what we had been practicing. First part everyone did well. Some people lost points for going out of the marked lines but not enough for anyone to be in trouble. The course was lots of fun and I learned quite a bit.
- Although I have not decided to be a solo rider, completing the BRC gave me great insight in what it takes to maneuver the motorcycle, the searching and evaluation that is constant when riding, which will certainly be beneficial as a passenger or driver. On the way home from the class, I also noticed that my perspective has changed - awareness of motorcycles and their challenges have increased.

This was followed by a friendly competition at the go cart track. Then it was off to the hospitality room to renew old friendships and meet new members from 5 different countries. On Friday it was an amazing day. Some of our Mass-2 members were out riding and found the Westminster Fire Department... complete with Routes 140 and 31 passing through town! Then we participated in a 58 mile, police escorted ride through Pennsylvania and Maryland. The line of 250 bikes seemed to stretch on for miles on our way to the National Fire Academy for a tour and meal. As always, we had the opportunity to pay our respects at the Fallen Firefighter Memorial and the nearby 9-11 Memorial. The keynote speaker was a women who

works for the foundation and lost her son, a firefighter. She explained what the foundation does for families of fallen firefighters and also how she felt losing her son. We were also able to locate the section of bricks on the memorial walkway that were dedicated by members of the Red Knights.

Saturday morning was the annual business meeting of the Red Knights. This is the first year that the election of officers was done through electronic voting, so there were no "nominations from the floor," helping to keep the meeting brief and to the point. There were no controversial votes this year and the questions and issues that were on the floor were handled quickly.

Saturday evening's dinner and ceremonies were a great success and held a big surprise for Mass-2. After the meal all the members of Mass-2 were called to the stage. Then it was announced that Ed Brouillet was recipient of the 2012 Perry Carter Award. It was a very emotional announcement!

Since we are into the fall months and enjoying the changing colors of the leaves, it is a good time to remind ourselves to keep the "**Three Leaves**" on our mind when we are riding:

- **Leave yourself an "out."**
Stop within view of the driver's rear-view mirror in front of you — but stop towards the side of the stopped vehicle so you have an escape route.
- **Leave your bike in first gear** with the clutch pulled in so you can make a quick escape (via your planned escape route) if needed.
- **Leave your eyes on your mirror as much as you feel safe in doing so, so that you have the opportunity to see a hazard approaching from the rear.**

Day dreaming, in neutral, while parked tight to the middle of the car stopped in front of you is how a rider can quickly become sandwich meat because of a driver's inattention.

Thank you to those who came out for our October meeting and election of officers. Congratulations to Kevin Martin, Tim Kilhart, Bob Shakarian, and Larry Robinson on their re-election/re-appointment to the chapter board. All those who serve our chapter deserve our thanks and recognition for the time and effort they each make in helping our Red Knights chapter be what it is.



- For married couples that ride together, the divorce rate is 70% lower than the national average.


As Fred said in his October column, we motorcyclists do not just exist, we "live life!"
