Why I ride. It all started back when I was a very young boy at the age of 10. My dad always had a passion for motorcycles but with a large family and always working to support that family he never had the opportunity to buy one of

his own.

After graduating from high school he enrolled in the Marine corps and was sent to Paris Island South Carolina for boot camp,

and being in South Carolina the mode of travel on base was via small cc motorcycles. My dad learned how to ride on the base and enjoyed the feeling of the freedom of not being "caged" up in the military vehicles, always dreaming of one day owning a Harley when he got out because that was all the rage back then. Well life happened and my dad met my mother and they decided to get married before my dad was to be deployed to Korea and spent a little more time here in the states. The time came to be deployed and all the marines were to meet in Worcester to board a bus that was to take them to a Marine base for their flight out.

As my dad was boarded on the bus one of the officers came to the bus and called out my dad's name and that he was to depart the bus and go see his staff Sargent. As he was getting off the bus his staff Sargent met him and broke the news that he was not going to Korea because they had found out his wife was pregnant and close to expecting his first son (Me!) and that the Marines didn't want to ship anyone overseas that had a new family. My dad was escorted to the hospital where my mother had been taken to and they welcomed their new addition to what was to become the first of eight children to the world.

As life moved on and my dad was always working I remember to this day the time he came home with my uncle's Honda 305 dream motorcycle, the same type of motorcycle that he had learned to drive in the Marines. It was a Saturday afternoon and he and I spent the afternoon together just putting around the back yard and a couple of short trips down the street.

My dad told my mother that he was going to the demolishin derby in Thompson CT and that he was taking me on the bike. I was so excited I could hardly wait to take a long ride on this bike. He acquired a helmet from one of my uncles and although a little big for my head it worked, helmet on, big smile on my face and it was off to the demolishin derby. We arrived and spent the time enjoying the show and rode back home afterwards. I can remember getting in late around 9:30-10:00 at night and my mom being upset with my dad because she had no idea where he had been. But that feeling of the wind in my face and the feel of the open road was something I would never forget.

Fast forward to my Junior year in high school and my friend down the street had a 1973 Yamaha 250 Enduro and I became intrigued with the fun he was having riding around the sand pits and popping wheelies. He let me try it, well it wasn't a good experience as I kept tipping over and going over backwards every time I tried but after a while I became pretty good at handling this monster machine and enjoyed riding as much as he did.

Eventually I was able to work a few odd jobs and save enough money to buy my own, a 1975 Yamaha 250 Enduro, my graduation present to me. I rode the tires off that machine and even got to learn how to ride dirt track in Lunenburg and had a lot of spills and crashes but all in the attempt to become a better rider. After getting tired of riding in the dirt and even run over a few times I decided to move on to road riding and some 7 or 8 years later I bought my first street bike a 1983 Shadow 700. Ed Brouillet and I had already been friends and he bought a Yamaha 650 Special that same year and he told me about this motorcycle gathering in New York called AspenCade. We decided to take our adventures out to see what it was all about, and what a great time we had. I've had a few more bikes in between and gone on many adventures since, but in 2004 I bought my first Harley Ultra Classic Firefighter Special in memory of my Dad who never got the chance to own his Harley. Today I'm on my third Harley and say what you will I still enjoy the thrill of the ride and freedom of the road. That is Why I (still) ride, and now part of the best Motorcycle chapter / club in the world. The Red Knights.

On the road with our friends...

Have you ever heard of “Dunbar’s Number?” No, not Mark and Cynthia’s phone number. Dunbar’s number is a cognitive limit to the number of people with whom one can maintain stable social relationships—relationships in which an individual knows who each person is and how each person relates to every other person. This number was first proposed by British anthropologist Robin Dunbar, who found a correlation between primate brain size and average social group size. By using the average human brain size and extrapolating from the results of primates, he proposed that humans can comfortably maintain only 150 stable relationships. Dunbar explained it informally as “the number of people you would not feel embarrassed about joining uninvited for a drink, if you happened to bump into them in a bar.”

This number has been proposed to lie between 100 and 250, with a commonly used value of 150. Dunbar’s number states the number of people one knows and keeps social contact with, and it does not include the number of people known personally with a ceased social relationship, nor people just generally known with a lack of persistent social relationship.

I bet a significant number of individuals within your Dunbar Number are Red Knights!

President Chris Gadway has announced he will not be seeking re-election in 2019.

Future Conventions:

2019 — Lincoln, New Hampshire — August 22-25

Loon Mountain Resort is the primary hotel and the Woodard Resort, just a few minutes away by shuttle is secondary.

Plans include a tour of the MSA fire equipment factory, Cog Railway, riding Mt. Washington Auto Road, and a number of self-guided tours in northern New England.

Plans are in the work to have vendors on site for pin-stripping, stitchers for batches, and bike manufacturers.

2020 — Leon, France! — August 17-23, 2020

This is the first time that the International Convention will be held outside of North America!

Functions, meetings, and hospitality room will be in a castle! You will be able to rent either BMW or HD rides while overseas.

Plans are in the works for a bus ride and tour to Normandy to visit Omaha and Utah beaches, as well as a memorial service at the U.S. WWI cemetery. Another bus trip is planned to Paris, including a stop at the Eiffel Tower, a boat tour and dinner at the Moulin Rouge.

Those wishing to stay overseas past Sunday can participate in a tour of the Battle of the Bulge WWII battlefields.

After an 11 hour drive out to western PA, arrival was festive as there were many Red Knights already in place and welcoming others as they arrived.

Wednesday evening attendees enjoyed a lovely dinner cruise and great buffet meal. The cruise began during daylight hours allowing those aboard to enjoy the shoreline sights. After dark it was even more enjoyable with colored lights on many bridges and buildings.

The summer weather had us all pool-side and there was a lot of fun at the Red Knight pool party. There were giant beach balls everywhere, and of course copious amounts of adult beverages to keep us hydrated.

The summer weather also brought threats of severe weather and hail that canceled the ride to Shanksville to visit the Flight 93 memorial. (But that will be on the docket again for the convention in 2022 in Johnstown). Friday we enjoyed a BBQ and plenty of socializing in the hospitality room. Indian Motorcycle and Yuengling Beer were the main hospitality room sponsors for the gathering.

There were 81 voting delegates from 24 countries in attendance at the annual business meeting on Saturday morning. The meeting went quite smoothly. Thirty-seven members have joined the Heaven-1 chapter since the 2017 convention.

It was announced that the Red Knights now have 450 chapters, 472 Members-at-Large, and a total of 9,825 members from around the world. There were 482 members at the convention.

There were several bylaw changes brought to convention. Those that we discussed as controversial, including who can hold chapter board positions, changing the Associate Member ratio, restricting voting rights of Associate and Social members, and requiring ballot voting were all voted down.

As usual, there was an awards banquet on Saturday evening. It included many awards and the international drawing. One winner was our own John Loiselle, who won second prize in the International raffle! Alan Billings from MD-4 received the Perry Carter award and our friend Daniel Walsdurger from Europe received an Outstanding Contribution recognition.

Sunday brought the annual farewell breakfast and goodbye hugs until next year. Then it was time to trek east and back

Most riders position their mirrors to provide the same rearward view, resulting in a duplicated

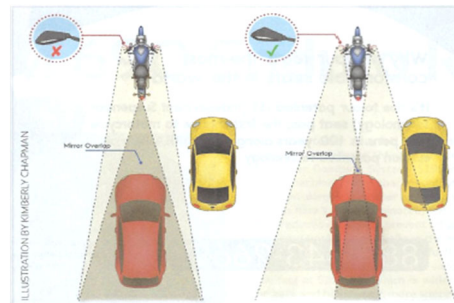


image and a much narrower overall view. By angling mirrors outward, the rider can expand and optimize the rearward view while still seeing everything behind.

Mirror, Mirror, on the Bar *Proper mirror positioning can give you the fairest view of them all*

You wouldn't ride with a blindfold on. Nor would you ride with blinders to obscure your peripheral vision (like horses wear). Yet, many riders keep their right and left mirrors adjusted in a way that provides the narrowest view (including an excellent view of their elbows).

Next time you hop aboard your bike, and before you

pull away, take a careful look into each mirror. What do you see? Is the view in the left mirror virtually the same as the view in the right mirror? How much of the scene behind you can you see in both mirrors? If the scene is largely duplicated by each, try angling both mirrors outward to expand the width of your overall view. The ideal adjustment allows you to see a vehicle directly behind in either mirror but with minimal overlap of that image. You should have a distinctly different view to the outside of the mirror now as well. The left mirror should reveal more of the space adjacent to your bike on the left (where cars pass), and the right mirror should expand the view of the space to the right of your bike (where merging vehicles appear from), significantly expanding your total rearward view.

While we're talking mirrors, it's a good time to consider what other drivers see. Car drivers have a rearview mirror mounted on the windshield that provides exactly what the name suggests: a rear view. Cars also have two side-view mirrors mounted to the outside of the vehicle on the right and left side. Unfortunately, despite the name, those mirrors are typically adjusted inward to take in the same rearward view as the inside mirror. That means that vehicles—including our motorcycles—are easily obscured from the driver's view. Be aware as you ride alongside other vehicles; if you can't see their reflection in the mirror, they can't see you!

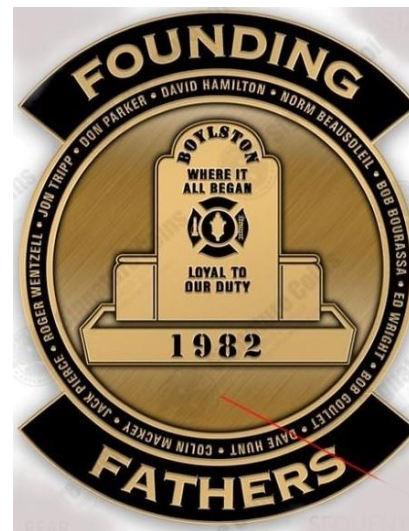
