They decided on the Four Corners Tour (https://sc-ma.com/four-corners-tour/) where you have to ride to the four corners of the U.S. (Madawaska, ME, Key West, FL, San Diego, CA, and Blain, WA) in under 21 days.

Ed and Steve had an on-line log that was kept from home as they messaged back and forth each day. And technology was not quite as easy then as it is now! You can

They raised \$8,800 that was presented to the Worcester Firefighters and raised awareness and interest in the Red Knights throughout the country as they traveled 12,083 miles on their journey, including a stop at the Red Knights International Convention in Indianapolis.

Helmet Care

Excerpts from Marisa McInturff's article in the July issue of Road Runner magazine

Although we often spend plenty of time picking out the perfect helmet, too many motorcyclists forget to take care of their lids after purchase. Here's how to give your helmet the care it deserves.

CLEAN THE INSIDE. Sweat, skin oil, dust, and the occasional bug inevitably make their way into your helmet. Over time, the accumulated crud can cause funky smells and degrade liner materials. Pop the liners out, wash them using mild soap, and air dry them completely before reassembly.

POLISH THE OUTSIDE. The exterior of your helmet goes through a lot-sun, bugs, rain, and road grime all take their toll. Clean the shell and visor with warm water and a microfiber cloth. Avoid harsh solvents or glass cleaners, especially on visors or any antifog coatings.

PROPER STORAGE. Avoid tossing it in a hot garage, hanging it on a hook, or leaving it in direct sunlight. Heat and UV rays can degrade the helmet materials over time, while hooks or other sharp objects can dent the impact liner. Instead, keep the helmet in a cool, dry, and clean place


KNOW WHEN TO SAY GOODBYE. Even the most beloved and well-cared-for helmet has an expiration date. Most manufacturers recommend replacing your helmet every five years, even if it looks perfectly fine. (I read a study that said that miles worn was a better indicator of helmet life — and the study found that 45,000-50,000 miles was the best correlation with that 5-year limit. If stored and maintained properly and you don't ride 10K a year, it may be OK to stretch it's life beyond 5 years, but if you ride more, you may want to replace it more frequently).

Mass Fall State Meeting

At the Fall State Meeting, hosted by MA-4 and held at the Huguenot Fire Museum in Oxford, Joe Hopkins was thanked for his service as Assistant State Rep and given a Region-1 Challenge coin. (There was no candidate to run as Assistant State Rep to replace Joe).

Seven Mass chapters were in attendance with 35 people in attendance (9 from MA2) and 2 founding fathers.

State Rep Martin reviewed the May Day Fund and said that it is being used as needed, and the funds remain healthy. All Region 1 coins had sold out at the convention and a new order of 250 new coins have been received.

Kevin spoke on the participation and business at both the Yankee Rally and the Convention. The 2026 Yankee Rally at the Finger Lakes is working to secure a 3rd hotel as the host hotel is almost full and the secondary is getting a lot of reservations already. To date there are already over 350 people registered.

MA-1 is opening their Christmas party to any member that would like to attend. It is scheduled for December 13th for 6 pm at the Bay Path Barn in Boylston. Cost for the meal is expected to be about \$40 and RSVPs would be due by November 20. More information will be made available.

Region-1 Rep Ken May and his wife Laura were on hand. Ken spoke that the Region lost 3 chapters in the last year, and currently has 95 chapters and 2,700 members. Twenty of the 54 additions to the Heaven-1 chapter, whose names were read at the convention, were from Region-1. There have been four additions from Region-1 to Heaven-1 since the convention.

Ken (and our Assistant State Rep) both mentioned that the International Board has released a new RKMC member application that is to be used by the chapters so that a standard intake document is used across the organization. This has been added to our MA-2 webpage.

George Colby, of MA3, brought up two proposals to amend the State SOGs. One is to spell out, specifically, what the State Rep can spend without prior authorization, and a second amendment to specifically state that any votes must be in person. These proposals will be brought up for a vote at the Spring state meeting.

Mr. Colby also brought up his concern for the need to modify an International bylaw and associated SOGs that pertain to complaints filed against members. Discussion revolved around a member's right to due process. A sub-committee of Colby, Bob Binnall and Mike Mahan will review this issue. (More detail of these proposals were in the state meeting minutes).

There was discussion about the 2032 Convention (Just 7 short years away) that will celebrate the 50th anniversary of the Red Knights. Bob Binnall said he was approached by a Founding Father about the idea of having Massachusetts host that convention.

Bob Binnall stated that he would chair the committee, but this endeavor would have to be all chapters and not just one or two acting as hosts.

International Convention — A great time in the Midwest!

Our Illinois brethren hosted a spectacular convention in Peoria, Illinois. There were five members from MA-2 that attended the convention, and each of us would tell you it was a great time — and the accommodations were fantastic, with spectacular views of the Illinois River.

There was a complementary buffet breakfast each morning, where made-to-order options were available. There was a social hour each night where the hotel provided snacks and beverages, and most of us would migrate out to the patio and enjoy our evenings by the river.

Of course, with a hotel full of firefighters, we could not make it through the week without a fire alarm! Because the hotel has an eight floor atrium that rises above the lobby, the fire alarm system uses lasers to watch for smoke. When one of the chapters was hanging their banner over the railing near their room, it hung low enough that it obstructed one of the beams and tripped the fire alarm.

Convention statistics were ~290 Red Knights, 88 chapters from 28 states and 7 countries (U.S., Canada, Switzerland, Austria, Belgium, Australia, and Germany).

We each had a different route to Illinois. Bob and Tim circled up to ride into Michigan before heading back

through Indiana and Illinois (and riding on Rt. 66). They also took a ride west of the Mississippi, to get into Iowa and Missouri (Tim also did a solo ride north into Wisconsin during the week). Rick took a Canadian route and came down to ride through Michegan, and cross the Mackinac Bridge into WI, MN, and ND before heading south back to the convention. Deb's route, after the convention, was bringing her to the Bootlegger Rally in Wisconsin, starting a few days after the convention.

Tim and Bob took a day and crossed the Mississippi into Iowa and Missouri, where they stopped in Keokuk, IA at their firefighter memorial. Some of you may remember, that just a couple weeks after the Worcester Cold Storage fire in 1999, Keokuk lost three of their firefighters.









With the convention in the Midwest, we did ride in windy conditions, and saw a lot of corn, soybeans, and windmills! But we also had some fantastic riding weather, and a great time, enjoying many miles!

Convention — continued

On Thursday of convention week, there was a guided tour up and down the scenic Illinois River, with a lunch stop at a great BBQ spot right on the river. Friday was a large (103 bikes) escorted ride from East Peoria to the state capital, Springfield. The East Peoria FD and PD led us out of the city, and the route was along the many miles of farmland. It is straight, and we experienced a lot of corn, soybeans and windmills. We stopped for lunch at a fire station where we filled the road in the neighborhood!

When we crossed into Springfield, there were motorcycle police waiting for us and escorted us through the city as police cruisers were blocking every intersection. A few blocks from the Capital Building, a SFD engine picked up the escort and brought us right to the capital grounds, where the Illinois Firefighter monument is located. The hosts had made arrangements to have a ceremony and lay a wreath at the memorial. A state senator welcomed us and thanked us for our service. During the ceremony, several of the Illinois

Red Knights each spoke of a firefighter whom they knew personally, whose name was on one of the bricks. A Red Knight playing the bagpipes also participated in the service.

The Red Knights will be purchasing a brick to be placed at the memorial.

The hospitality room was always active, with a lot of smiles. On Friday night, everyone enjoyed a cook-out themed dinner in the banquet hall.

There was a company providing entertainment in the hall during dinner. They set up an axe throwing booth and a bow and arrow booth to keep us occupied! Of course there was some friendly competition between Red Knights.

There were tables set up in the hallway leading to the dinner site where chapters could sell wares during several of the days. We did exceptionally well. Tim said we surpassed any sales we have done in the past at conventions!

Along with chapter wares, there were several raffles and auctions. Dave Hamilton's fire engine trailer was auctioned off and brought in \$2,500! Half of the proceeds went to a burn center and half to the memorial hall mortgage. Rick Oliver donated a Jack Daniels barrel to Australia and it brought in \$1,400 to help with their planning efforts.

And OF COURSE, there were several MA-2 members that picked up prizes from the raffle!

The annual business meeting took place on Saturday morning. Details of the meeting appear on a later page of this newsletter.

The hotel was connected to a convention center, across the street from the hotel. It was a large venue, and even with nearly 300 Red Knights, we easily shared space in the building, as a wedding reception was taking place on Saturday as well as our celebration. The bride even had pictures taken with some Red Knights.

Our banquet was very good, with Boneless Chicken, Roast Beef, veggies, and all the fixes to suit our appetites. I do not think that they planned on how firefighters eat, however, because the second round of dessert pies they brought out to refill the table were still partially frozen!

Prior to the recognition of those members that transferred to the Heaven-1 chapter, Louisiana-1 presented the members with a bell (and travel case) to be used for such occasions. As each member appeared on the projection screen and their names were read, the bell sounded.

During the awards section of the evening, our own Bob Laford was recognized with the 2025 Perry Carter Red Knight of the Year Award. Bob's voice was a little shaky when he was handed the microphone, but like he said, even if we may not see eye-to-eye, the Red Knights are a very special family.

The convention and the accompanying weather was just superb. Our Illinois brothers and sisters did a great job as hosts, and we thank them all for their work.









RKMC International 2025 Annual Business Meeting

There were 69 voting delegates for the meeting. Our meeting moved along smoothly, with very little discussion on the topics. The meeting wrapped up within 3 hours.

As with every year's report, several chapters' charters were recalled. For 2025, 15 chapters had their charters revoked as they were in arears for 2 years. The Regional Directors each reached out to every member that was on the chapters' rosters in an attempt to save chapters. The 15 were AL5, Australia-4, England-3, IL-3, IN-10, ME-13, NB-2, NY-52, NC-10, NC-11, NS-5, OH-8, and TX-15.

A couple line items taken from the Finance report included:

- (1) The line item for legal services last year were in the red \$38,000 because they had the 10 year legal review and audit of the trademark license and they did not plan for that expense,
- (2) \$173,946 was received in dues,
- (3) \$103,179 left on the mortgage.
- (4) Donations to the memorial totaled \$3,169
- (5) 46 Events had been insured by the International in the last year.
- (6) Five claims from the AD&D insurance, held by members, have had benefits paid out (\$20,000), and 2 more claims are pending.

After the reports on the 2026 (Australia) and 2027 (Cruise hosted by Ontario-1) Conventions, proposals were heard from chapters wishing to hold 2028, 2029, and 2030. It was voted to accept these proposals for the upcoming conventions:

- 2028 St. John New Brunswick (NB 1, 4, and 7)
- 2029 Cherokee, NC (NC 13 & 26)
- 2030 There was no proposal for 2030

The E-board explained that if there were a year that no convention had a host, the Board would hold its annual business meeting without a convention, as it did during COVID.



Bylaw proposal votes from the International Convention

Proposal 1, PASSED (To reinsert hierarchy chart of officers into bylaw document).

Proposal 2, PASSED (Contained rewording of "representative" references in a number of bylaws throughout the document so that it was consistent).

Proposal 3, FAILED (Proposal was to only play hosts national anthem at the banquet, but will remain to play the national anthem of all countries present).

Proposal 4, PASSED (To add wording that "FD Associates" who no longer work for FD can retain their status as members. This mirrors wording that allows other categories of membership).

Proposal 5, PASSED (To change wording for state and regional officers to allow Social and Associate members to run for certain offices, similar to the wording for chapter officers).

Proposal 6, NO VOTE TAKEN (This was the electronic voting proposal. Point of order was brought up that this proposal would cause multiple conflicts throughout the bylaw document and could not be voted on in its current form).

2026 International Convention August 18-23, 2026

2026 Convention will be in Melbourne Australia at Pullman on the Park. Tram and Railway access are nearby to the hotel.

The report presented at the convention highlighted several rides, one is a two day with coordination by Eagle Rider. This ride appears to be mostly coastal routes, including a ferry trip, and includes the "Great Ocean Road." There would be an up charge of \$100 plus rental for that ride. Another event was a bus trip to the animal sanctuary that features a "Penguin Parade" and animals indigenous to Australia.

\$100 convention registration and room (with conversion) looks to be about \$225 per night, with the USD conversion.

It is late winter for them at this time of year. Regional Rep Andy Yung told us that currently, mornings are around freezing with daytime temps 45-60 degrees.

Most people planning on traveling to Australia for next year's convention were talking about extending their trip, on either side of the convention dates to spend some timing touring the region.

Pope Leo XIV recently blessed and signed a customized BMW that will be

auctioned off for a fundraiser to help fund children's aid projects. The bike was donated by BMW and includes the Vatican coat of arms.



The 2027 Convention is being hosted by Ontario 1 and the itinerary is a cruise out of Miami on the Royal Caribbean "Wonder of the Seas". The ship boasts 2,867 rooms and holds 5,734 guests.


Two of ONT-1 members run a travel agency (Expedia Cruises).

It is a Five-day cruise:

- 8/23/27 Miami,
- 8/25 Nassau Bahamas where they also have a private area for an up charge.
- 8/26 cruise day.

The ship has a casino that operates anytime they are cruising. They also have adult only sections of the ship.

Cost is \$1,649-\$1,997 per person (Canadian Dollar) dependent on



room. Currently that is \$1,200-\$1,450 USD per person. Fees are all inclusive on the ship and their private island, including drinks. These prices do not include airfare.

Fees are fully refundable up to 8 months prior to the voyage.

We thank those that have taken the time to share with Us their "Bio's" and hope others will participate in the future!

Here we welcome the "bios" submitted from **Joe and Donna Hopkins**. Both Donna and Joe are International Life Members and come to MA -2 as dual members with MA-4.

Joe joined the Brimfield Fire Dept in 1966 as a Junior FF until he left for the Navy (1970-1974). While in the Navy he was trained in damage control and fire suppression on board submarines, serving on the USS Hunley, the USS Sirago, the USS Casimir Pulask, and on the USS Inchon. He then returned to the Brimfield Fire Department, serving on BFD for 20 years, rising to Lieutenant (and EMT).

As he moved around, Joe also served on the Sturbridge Fire Department, the Charlton Fire Department and the Stokesdale, NC Fire Department and the West Brookfield Fire Department, where he retired from in 2021.

Joe first became interested in the Red Knights Motorcycle Club when he was on the Brimfield Fire Department. He joined MA IV out of Fiskdale in 1984, where he is a Charter Member and a Life Member of MA IV. He held various positions on MA IV's executive board including president and vice president. He also served as the International VP position in the eighties. Joe recently stepped down as the Mass Assistant State Rep. He also currently serves as the Chair of the Red Knights Historical Research Committee.

Joe remarks that he is still a member of the Red Knights because he enjoys the overall comradery of riding with others who share both the background of being a firefighter and the love of riding motorcycles. His favorite memories are the conventions in the early years and doing rides with other chapters.

Outside of the fire service, Joe attended East Coast Aero Tech, where he received his Airframe & Powerplant certification. He has spent the last 35 years working in the field of aviation as an Aviation Maintenance Tech in corporate and commercial aviation. He also spent a few years as an instructor at the National Aviation Academy and is still working part-time at the Southbridge Airport, working on private planes.

Joe started riding dirt bikes off road when as a teenager, changing over to on-road riding in 1971 when he was stationed at the Charleston, SC Naval Base. He has had several bikes including 6 Harley ELTRA-Glides. He recently changed over to an Indian Roadmaster in 2023, and says it is his favorite by far.

His work as an Aviation Maintenance Tech took he and Donna to Florida and North Carolina.

While in Florida he helped start the RK FL-3 Treasure Coast Chapter and while in North Carolina he helped start the North Carolina 7 Chapter in Graham.



Donna joined the Red Knights (MA Chapter IV) when she met Joe in 1989. She also served as secretary for a short time with MA IV, and was also able to plan and execute a fun scavenger hunt event at Yankee Candle, Deerfield, MA.

When the Hopkins moved to Templeton in 2021 they started riding with MA 2 and joined MA 2 in 2023.

Donna is currently working alongside Joe doing research and secretarial duties for the RKMC Historical Committee.

Charlie served 40 years with the Westminster Fire Department, rising to the rank of Deputy Chief before retiring in 2004. As Deputy Chief of the Westminster (MA) Fire Department, Charlie developed a collaborative team of Deputy Chiefs from throughout the north-central Massachusetts area. This team would work together to discuss issues that affected all departments and work on goals that would help them all improve.

Working with this team of senior fire officers, Charlie spearheaded a regional call firefighter training program, bringing together new firefighters from throughout the area to train together for their basic firefighter training. Many of those "new recruits" are now senior fire officers and chiefs. That collaborative training effort not only helped Charlie's department, but all the local departments benefited from this collaborative effort.

In 2001 the Commonwealth of Massachusetts recognized Charlie and his leadership with the Firefighter of the Year Award for his work in creating the training program. The Commonwealth's Department of Fire Service now runs a Call Firefighter Recruit Training program throughout the state to fill the need for initial training of firefighters between departments. A need that Charlie saw many years prior.

We often see Charlie wearing his Navy hat, but what many do not know is that while serving, the Cuban Missile Crisis happened (1962) and he says that from his viewpoint as a sailor, that was a very scary situation!

He mentions his travels, not only with the Red Knights, but with the Navy. As Charlie puts it, during his time in the Navy he traveled to many different places that he would have never visited on his own. He remembers traveling through the Suez Canal, and also visiting Barcelona, Spain where he met and shook hands with

John Wayne!

Charlie says that as a young man, he always wanted to ride motorcycles, but family life and household finances delayed that until he was a bit older. That time arrived, and since he had recently purchased a bike and started riding in 1983, when MA-2 held its first organizational meeting — Charlie was there. And has been there since then!

He and his wife Joyce put on over 150,000 miles together riding their motorcycles, many miles as the chapter's road captain for 16 years — and he stressed that he enjoyed every mile of it!

Like many of us he went from a small bike, to his Suzuki Cavalcade, to the bike he liked the most, his 2002 Honda Goldwing.

Charlie says that he enjoyed meeting with and working with others throughout the state (and beyond) helping other chapters along the way. He served as Mass State Rep for 15 years, and was also International's first Chairman of the Board of Directors. He was actually THE FIRST State Representative throughout the Red Knights!

He mentioned that his favorite road trip was cross country with other members of MA-2. You will have to ask him (or one of the others on the trip) about crossing the Golden Gate Bridge, something he was NOT looking forward to on the trip!

Peg says that the best decision she ever made was to marry her soulmate, Ed.

Peg tells us that this is indeed an amazing group and she would like to thank us all for your love and support since the loss of a very special person in her life and in ours. She says she knows Ed is looking down with others who went before him with great pride for this group.

Peg noted that her "surprise info" is that she did the twist on stage in Atlantic City, N.J. with Paul Anka!!

Kevin Martin first joined the Red Knights in 1993, and is a Life Member of MA-2, where he has served as Chapter President and Chapter Vice-President, and is currently serving as Massachusetts State Rep.

Kevin has served with the Ashburnham,
