

Escort for the run was provided by the Essex Co. Sheriffs Dept. and the NY State Police.

Of the 236 bikes on the ride many 1%'ers, Blue Knights, Red Knights and AMA clubs attended beside Antique Police Car Clubs. At the end over \$6000.00 was donated to Eric's family.

August 12, 2005

To All Board Members,

The past 12 months in the SE Region has been very exciting. The SE Region has expanded with at least one Chartered Chapter in every state within the Region and a state representative in all 15 states. Three newly chartered State Associations and 5 states requesting applications for state association charters. Along with these state associations we have organized a Regional Association called "DIXIE" Confederation Of Southern Chapters with a full slate of Regional officers installed into office and actively working with a Bylaws & Constitution committee which should have a finished draft to submit to the International before the close of 2005 along with a request for Charter Membership.

I have been fortunate to have a group of people working with me as State Reps and "DIXIE", CSC executive board officers who are focused and in agreement to a common goal - that being - "promoting the Red Knight tradition wherever we are.

I filed the above report on August 12 with visions of returning home and continuing with good news and prosperity in the SE Region, but August 25, 2005 changed all the good news coming from South Florida where I live.

Then hurricane Katrina hit us dead center. As everyone knows, Katrina hit a devastating blow to the gulf coast of the United States and a deeper blow to the Red Knights family in Louisiana, Alabama and Mississippi – leaving many Red Knights homeless in the aftermath of her path on August 29.

On August 31, 2005 I received a call from Chris Gadway our "DIXIE" CSC quartermaster asking to put into place a Katrina relief program for those who are going to need our help. I started making phone calls to the "DIXIE" CSC executive board and within 48 hours we had made contact with members in Alabama and Mississippi inquiring what damage they had and how they fared the storm. I was amazed to hear everyone from those states were OK. Some had damage to their homes but everyone was in pretty good shape. Late on September 1st we made contact with Steve Guillot, president of LA-1 and LA state representative. He and his family had evacuated to Shreveport, LA to evade the path of Katrina. They were OK but had no idea where everyone else was. The rest of the week was spent trying to locate 140 Red Knights members from LA-1, LA-3,

LA-4, LA-5, 5-MAL's and their families who were homeless and stranded all over the south. We found many had evacuated to the Texas area and were with their families and safe. We started a communication path and were able to get information out and receive information back relaying through several stations.

Through the efforts of Flint Breeding, Texas State Rep, and the Texas State Association as well as Dallis Johnson, Alabama State Rep, and Alabama State Association we were able to locate and set up housing for any RKMC members who needed assistance. We contacted the International Executive officers requesting their assistance in contacting all RKMC chapters to seek funding for a hurricane "Disaster Relief Fund." With their help a fund has been established and a "First Response" assistance is in place through contributions from many RKMC members and RKMC supporters. The following is an exact correspondence I sent out to the "DIXIE" CSC officers:

To All,

First let me express my gratitude for all the work that all the Dixie officers are putting forth to assist in this situation. We have established immediate funding from the International Red Knights. The money is in our treasurer's account which is controlled by Jimmy Ledbetter in Texas and regulated by the "DIXIE" CSC executive officers. I feel a need for a plan of action to be established so these funds can be made available to displaced Red Knights and their families in the aftermath of the destruction caused by Hurricane Katrina.

The International President has directed International Secretary Snodgrass to contact all Chapter Presidents requesting donations. These donations will be sent to the International Treasurer Leo Patry. Donations received by Leo will be logged and recorded and combined in an account, and checks will be issued to Jimmy Ledbetter for disbursements to members in need. Any donations that you may receive can be forward to Leo Patry or directly to Jimmy Ledbetter at PO BOX 179, Alvin, Texas, 77512.

Any members that you know of that need assistance you may contact Jimmy Ledbetter or Gene Downs.

Housing has been established and made available through the combined efforts of the Texas State Association. The contact person of the Texas State association is Flint Breeding, cell 214-535-2859. Housing has also been made available by efforts of the Alabama State Association. The contact person for the Alabama State Association is Dallis Johnson, cell 334-391 -3558.

Plan of action:

#1 Priority is to make contact and locate all displaced members within the states of Louisiana, Alabama, and Mississippi. Along with the location of these members, establish their needs for immediate relief such as money made available for food and necessities. Find out if housing is needed and if so make contact with Texas Association or Alabama Association and assist in routing these members to the nearest location.

#2 Priority is that after these members have returned to their residences, evaluate the damage that may have occurred during the storm and what relief and assistance is needed by these members to maintain a quality of life.

#3 Priority is to identify those members who have lost their residence and would require long term housing and to assist these members in relocating to other long term housing. Of these members who have spouses who were active in fire-rescue, deployed to maintain their working operations, assistance needs to be provided for fuel for these members to travel to where their families are being housed back to their work stations. I would suggest the possibilities of purchasing gas cards and phone cards to be issued to these families instead of issuing cash. Grocery stores need to be identified and food cards purchased and issued. Gift cards for Wal-Mart and Target could be purchased as well.

It is of utmost importance that our members be found and their needs identified and reestablish the best quality of life available.

"WE WILL LEAVE NO ONE BEHIND!"

It is with sincere hopes and prayers that by the time this is released and printed in the RKMC newsletter that all our members and families are back home safe.

Don Parker gave a report for the 25th Anniversary convention in Massachusetts for 2007. Bill Snodgrass reported on plans for 2008 in Sandusky, Ohio. Jack Downs reported on 2009 in Florida — unknown exactly where it will be since the hotel they were planning to use blew away with the last year's hurricanes.

-The host chapter opted to give half of the money collected for "the host chapter's charity" to the Red Knights Memorial Fund.

- Saturday also offered the attendees a short ride and demonstration of the impressive State Police Motorcycle Drill Team. They rode in formation and saluted the International President during the exhibition. There were a lot of ooooh's and aaaah's throughout the show. First Lady, Peg Brouillet, was even escorted to the middle of the demonstration area to video the bikes coming directly at her as they criss-crossed just in front of her. Fraternally Jack C. Downs, Vice-president R. K. M. C. International TAKEN FROM THE EXECUTIVE SECRETARY'S REPORT, PRESENTED AUGUST 10, 2005 AT ANNUAL CONVENTION IN TORONTO CANADA

- 1. Working with the International Treasurer a numbered system has been designed and put in place for the issuing and tracking of new chapter applications. This allows us to know where and when applications are sent and helps to track applications until they are received back.
- 2. The Regional Directors are notified when an application is sent to a chapter in their Region and receive a list of any outstanding applications in their Regions every 60 days.
- 3. From 9/01/04 to 12/31/04, 57 applications for new chapters were mailed and 29 became new chapters (51%). By August of '05, we have sent out 47 applications for new chapters and have awarded 18 new chapters (38%). There are 7 application requests pending including the United Kingdom, Austria, Iraq, Iceland, Germany and Japan.
- 4. A data base has been set up for when and where we issue new chapter charters. The Regional Directors are notified about new Charters.
- 5. A data base, system, and application has been established for both State/Provincial Associations and Regional Associations. The State/Province Representatives will request an Association application from the Regional Director who then in turn requests one be sent from the Secretary.
- 6. The Secretary and Dick Morse have continued work on the revision of the International By-Laws.
- An Standard Operating Guideline (SOG) manual has been developed for the International Executive Board.
- 8. A data base has been set up with K & K insurance to track the insurance that we provide to our chapters.

To date we have insured 17 events for our chapters.

- 9. 1st Responder News has been contacted and we are now advertising in 11 issues covering New England, New Jersey, New York, Long Island, Pennsylvania, California, Florida, Georgia, Ohio and the Firehouse Expo Edition. We are now looking into advertising on the west coast.
- 10. We now have data bases set up for equipment inventories, for deceased members, and e-mail voting. Working with the International Treasurer we now have a data base of Chapter Charter Locations and dates.

Is your chapter planning an event that will involve the public?

The Red Knights will provide \$1,000,000 liability coverage through the K & K Insurance Company of Fort Wayne, Indiana for motorcycle shows, bike washes, breakfast/dinners, guided tours, swap meets, poker/toy runs, social gatherings/parties, parades, trade show and dances sponsored by chartered chapters of the International. (Contact the International Secretary for costs). *For events other than those listed contact the Executive Secretary for more information.*

Chapters/State Associations need to contact the Executive Secretary for an application and more information 30 days before the event. A Certificate of Insurance will be issued to the Chapter/Association hosting the event. Failure to give the Executive Secretary the allotted time may result in your Chapter/Association not receiving the insurance for your event.

A Release and waiver of liability form must be signed by all attending members and returned to the Executive Secretary after the event being covered. This is a requirement set in place by K&K Insurance. These waivers must be maintained by the Red Knights International Motorcycle Club for a period of seven years. Failure to return the signed waivers may result in your Chapter/Association not being allowed insurance in the future.

<u>RED KNIGHTS Grand Tour</u>

What is the Grand Tour?

When the club was young, the easiest way to tell others about it was by word of mouth. This meant that the members had to get out to visit other firefighters in their areas, and one of the best ways to do that was to visit Fire Stations. Someone came up with the idea of rewarding members who made a certain number of visits with a certificate and a pin. Proof of these visits was needed and so the idea of Grand Tour was born.

How do I earn a Grand Tour Pin

In order to earn a Grand Tour Pin you must first get an application form from the G.T. chairperson, then during the course of one (1)riding season you must visit nine (9) fire Stations whose names begin with the letters G R A N D T O U R. or twelve Fire Stations beginning with any letter of the alphabet (this is for members who live in some of the more remote areas and may not be able to come up with Stations beginning with the letters g r a n d t o u r). You must have a picture of you and your motorcycle taken at each Station, with the name sign visible. Co-riders may also earn a pin and a rider and co-rider may have their picture taken together.

When you have completed your visits simply fill out the application form and return it with your pictures to the GT chairperson and he/she will send you your certificate and pin.

Photo albums will be kept displaying pictures of everyone who has completed the Grand Tour and will be available at all future conventions. So if you would like to see this program continue please get out there and support it.
