State Meeting of Chapter Officers

In October we met with other chapter officers from around the state. Our State Rep and Assistant State Rep held the meeting at the Cotuit Fire Department with the President of Mass-8 as our host.

There were 8 chapters represented with nearly 30 people in attendance. We discussed RKMC business, gave each other ideas on member involvement, and shared ride and event ideas.

One planned event for 2010 is having Massachusetts Red Knights participate in the "World's Largest Poker Run." This is scheduled for Saturday, May 1. In Mass we are planning that each chapter hold their own ride for their members and the last stop will be at the Red Knights Memorial in Boylston at the same time. That will give us an opportunity to have some social time together between the chapters.

Look for more details as it gets closer.

In December, Dr. Hurt, primary researcher/author of the Hurt Report passed away. For the past 30 years Dr. Hurt's research has been the bench mark in motorcycle crash statistics. Here is a re-print of an article that discussed some of his work.

In 1981, a report documenting Motorcycle Accident Cause Factors and Identification of Countermeasures was released; it is commonly known as the "Hurt" report or study. It is named for Hugh H. Hurt, a University of Southern California professor who headed the committee that investigated more than 900 motorcycle accidents and documented their findings. Although many years have passed since the Hurt report was published, it is still considered to be highly relevant to today's bikes and riders. Here are a few of the basic findings of the Hurt report:

- Approximately 75% of the motorcycle accidents involved collisions with other vehicles, usually a passenger automobile.
- Approximately 25% of the motorcycle accidents were single vehicle accidents and involved the motorcycle colliding with the roadway or some other fixed object in the environment.
- Roadway defects such as pavement ridges, potholes, etc. were the accident cause in 2% of the accidents and animals were involved in 1%.
- The most frequent accident configuration is when a motorcycle was traveling straight and an automobile made a left turn in front of the oncoming motorcycle.
- Intersections are the most likely place for a motorcycle accident.
- Weather is **not** a factor in 98% of motorcycle accidents.
- Most motorcycle accidents occur during a short trip that is associated with shopping, errands, friends, entertainment or recreation and these accidents occur shortly after the trip originates.
- Lack of attention to driving is a common factor in motorcycle accidents.
- Almost 50% of the fatal motorcycle accidents show alcohol involvement.

The Hurt Report is lengthy and detailed (well over 400 pages). Some facts seem irrefutable and others may surprise you. You can purchase the complete report from the National Technical Information Service but this is not truly necessary since you can obtain the basic findings of the report online by searching for "Hurt Report".

Take some time to review the summaries of the Hurt Report; learning from the accidents of others makes us all safer riders.



A stop at the Red Knights Memorial was on the docket for the Chapter's Polar Bear Ride in November. Here Ed Brouillet and Larry Robinson lay a bouquet of flowers at the memorial on behalf of the chapter. The November sunshine allowed us a very pleasant day for our last official ride of the season. Thirteen bikes with 15 members took advantage of the pleasant weather for the ride.

Put your Game Face on!

OK, It's almost Superbowl time and it's really not the time of year that we are spinning hundreds of miles on our bikes. But in a recent article in Ride Magazine Eric Trow made a number of correlations between good gridiron management and safe riding. Below are some excerpts from his January "Riding Well" column.

Just like a quarterback, as riders we're trying to move ourselves forward towards a goal. And, just like the QB, we're surrounded by large, often aggressive opposition. And, if we're not making the right calls and reading plays as they develop, we're going to get ourselves sacked. So here are a few ideas blatantly pulled from yesterday's games that I think could lead to a winning season of motorcycle commuting.

Put on your game face. In a post-game interview a player on the losing team said that his head just wasn't in the game from the very beginning. As a result he played poorly. How many mornings do we truly have our heads in the game before we roll out of the garage? As onroad quarterbacks, we need to set aside distraction and take control of the game.

Look downfield. Quarterbacks (the

good ones) have a knack for being able to look downfield and accurately recognize what's developing while remaining aware of what's going on immediately around them. Similarly, when riding a motorcycle in traffic, it helps to look long, not just at that "I brake for gnomes" bumper sticker on the car directly ahead. The key is to recognize developing situations early enough to leave time to modify our game plan.

Stay in the pocket. When a quarterback leaves the pocket too early and begins to scramble he's leaving his protection and is heading into "no man's land." Out on the street, we are often able to create a safety bubble in traffic where we can establish a degree of protection from others. While we remain in that pocket, we buy time to read the field of traffic and to plan our next move. The moment we step out of that bubble by riding faster than traffic or changing lanes when there is less than sufficient space, we are scrambling [without protection].

Avoid the blindside tackle.

Fortunately, as motorcyclists we do have one advantage over our NFL counterparts — we have eyes in the back of our heads. Well, mirrors anyway. We need to regularly use our mirrors to maintain full awareness of vehicles

approaching from behind.

Use your blockers. Just as a quarterback or running back relies on blockers to advance a running play, there are opportunities to use select vehicles on the road to be a buffer between us and other traffic.

Manage the play clock. In addition to other skills, the quarterback must also be the master of managing the clock. Likewise, it helps to recognize how much time we have to work within any given traffic situation. When is the best time to accelerate past a TT unit to avoid being stuck in a blind spot? How long can we be in a lane before that SUV closing in from our rear is uncomfortably close?

In traffic, our windows of opportunity and safety rapidly change. Being constantly aware of changing dynamics and how best to use our time can greatly improve our chance of gaining ground safely.

Review the game films. Once the side stand is down, consider taking a few moments to re-ride the trip in your mind before heading into work (or home). Think about the many "plays" that happened and speculate on how you might have ridden things differently if you had to do it again.
