
Come enjoy some time with friends at a holiday pot-luck. This year we are guests at the On Site Academy on Bragg Hill in Westminster. Some of our



The 18th annual Motorcycle Ride to Work Day is Monday, June 15th. Every year on this day, over a million workers commute via motorcycles and scooters to demonstrate the positive benefits of these efficient vehicles.

Studies have shown the public benefits of motorcycling include:

- Motorcycles and scooters share parking spaces, making more space for everyone else.
- Motorcycles and scooters consume significantly less resources per mile than automobiles.
- Motorcycles and scooters reduce traffic congestion and save travel time.

According to the United States Census Bureau and the Department of Transportation, over 80 million cars and light trucks are used for daily commuting on American roads, and only about 200,000 motorcycles and scooters are a regular part of this mix. On Ride to Work Day, the practical side of riding becomes more visible as a much

larger number of America's 8,000,000 cycles are ridden to work.



QUICK TIPS to Group Riding


Many of our members' bikes are equipped with CB radios so we can communicate when we are on a ride together. Sometimes we leaders forget that there are also members that do not have radio communications and if we do not spend some time at each ride talking about ride expectations, routes, "what if's" before we leave, it may leave someone stressed out—and that does not make for an enjoyable ride.

Here are some preparation and riding tips on "Group Riding" that was put out by the Motorcycle Safety Foundation.

- Arrive prepared. Arrive on time with a full tank of gas. All riders are responsible for making sure their motorcycles are mechanically up to the task. Before you even meet up with the group, make sure you've got plenty of fuel in the tank, and you've taken care of all those maintenance issues. Not sure what to check? Use T-CLOCS. You really don't want to be the reason for stopping the group for something mechanical you could have prevented
- If YOU are not feeling 100%, let one of the ride leaders know before the ride so we can keep an extra eye out.
- Know the range of your motorcycle so gas stops can be pre-planned and communicated before the ride begins.
- Participate in a riders' meeting. Discuss things like the
 route, rest and fuel stops, and hand signals. Assign a lead
 and sweep (tail) rider. Both should be experienced riders
 who are well-versed in group riding procedures. The
 leader should assess everyone's riding skills and the
 group's riding style.
- Keep the group to a manageable size, ideally five to seven riders. If necessary, break the group into smaller subgroups, each with a lead and sweep rider. (With larger groups we will try to have secondary leaders within the group that can take over "lead" when the group separates.
- Ride prepared. At least one rider in each group should pack a cell phone, first-aid kit, and full tool kit, so the group is prepared for any problem that they might encounter.
- Ride in formation. The staggered riding formation allows a proper space cushion between motorcycles so that each rider has enough time and space to maneuver and to react to hazards. The leader rides in the left third of the lane, while the next rider stays at least one second behind in the right third of the lane; the rest of the group follows the same pattern. A single-file formation is preferred on a curvy road, under conditions of poor visibility or poor road surfaces, entering/leaving highways, or other situations where an increased space cushion or maneuvering room is needed. (2 or 3 second spacing or more)

- At intersections where you've come to a stop, tighten the formation to side-by-side to take up less space. As the light turns green, or when traffic opens up, the bike on the left proceeds through first.
- Avoid side-by-side formations, as they reduce the space cushion. If you suddenly needed to swerve to avoid a hazard, you would not have room to do so. You don't want handlebars to get entangled.
- Keep in eye on the rider directly ahead and behind you but also scan past the rider directly ahead of you to keep aware of conditions ahead. It is important never to keep your eyes glued on the back of the rider directly ahead of you. Instead, use your eyes to scan the area ahead of that rider. In fact, your eyes should "watch" 2-6 seconds ahead of your current position.
- Periodically check the riders following in your rear view mirror. If you see a rider falling behind, slow down so they may catch up. If all the riders in the group use this technique, the group should be able to maintain a fairly steady speed without pressure to ride too fast to catch up.
- If you're separated from the group, don't panic. Your group should have a pre-planned procedure in place to regroup. Don't break the law or ride beyond your skills to catch up.
- ALWAYS RIDE YOUR OWN RIDE. Do not push your riding skills beyond what is safe for you. Remember that riding in a group does not mean you surrender any decision making when it comes to your safety.

If you must leave the formation because of a problem (and do not have radio communication) use a hand signal like this one (below), that would tell riders behind you that you are having a problem. Many times our group begins to break up at different portions of a ride and if you just turn on your directional and make a turn, it might be interpreted that you are making a planned exit. But if you use an obvious hand signal, then the others will know that there is an issue and someone will follow you off the route.
