Did you know, that according to the registrar of motor vehicles, there are 4.5 million licensed drivers in Massachusetts. Of those, 2.5 million drivers hold the Motorcycle Endorsement. That means that more than half the licensed drivers in our State have driven a motorcycle at some point in their lives.

Also, the registrar said that his statistics show that of the 160,000 (or so) registered motorcycles on the road, the average owner is 43 years old and is in a household with an income in excess of \$60K a year. Doesn't match that 1950's illusion of the *bad biker* does it!

Below is a partial excerpt from the Springfield Union News from 5/22/01. Think about what much of the public perception of "bikers" is — and how wrong they are.

Motorcycles vs. merchants

NORTHAMPTON — Some Main Street shop owners want to freeze out what have become known as the "ice cream bikers," but others contend that motorcyclists and merchants can coexist peacefully.

The brouhaha between motorcyclists who park on Main Street around Bart's Homemade Ice Cream and some store owners who worry that their business is being hurt by their presence has been mounting for several months.

In the past few weeks it has revved up, prompting the city to hire a professional mediator to help reach a resolution.

Some Main Street business owners' discontent centers on problems with customer parking, the [perceived] noise and exhaust, and the large crowds congregating around the bikes.

The city has a parking ordinance that allows only one vehicle per parking space.

Alan L. Scheinman, a lawyer who owns a Harley Davidson Low-Rider, says the law is on the side of the bikers. The state allows more than one motorcycle per parking space, and the machines must pass noise and pollution inspections in order to be on the road.

"We are not breaking the law," he said. Moreover, Scheinman points out that the "ice cream bikers" patronize the downtown businesses, particularly the coffee shops.

"We are all huge customers of these places," he said.

Support Nelly's Bill

Steve Mickle and Bob Laford were invited to speak on behalf of the Red Knights at the District 4 meeting of the Massachusetts Motorcycle Association.

This group has a very aggressive lobbying effort and the meeting on May 22 was open to the public to garner support of Nelly's Bill.

Also in attendance at the meeting were State Senartor Steve Brewer and Representative Reed Hilman.

"Nelly's Bill," currently in the Massachusetts Legislature, will require a motorcycle awareness component into the driver's education programs in high schools and commercial driving schools across the state. The bill was filed by State Representative Bradford Hill (R-Ipswich), a member of the Joint Committee on Public Safety. Several other Senators and Representatives have also signed on as cosponsors of the Bill.

The Bill was filed in memory of Nelson ⁴ Selig, Sr., of Essex, who was killed last April when a 19-year old operator crossed into his lane. Motorcyclists from around the state have banded together in support of this legislation. It is predicted that Nelly's Bill would begin a process of making new drivers aware of motorcycles on the road. A similar program is underway in Virginia. The Motorcycle Safety Foundation developed an 8-minute video and course instruction module that could be implemented immediately.
