As we are beginning a new riding season consider taking a Motorcycle Safety Foundation experienced riders course. New riders and veterans alike will learn new skills for the road through one of these courses.

A friend of mine had his daughter's new boyfriend show up on a motorcycle at his house one day. Hal had ridden motorcycles himself for most of his adult life, so the conversation turned to rider training. His younger visitor scoffed at the idea, since he was "self taught, and had been riding for a few years already." Hal made the young man a bet. He would foot the money to pay for the course. If the young rider learned nothing, that was the end of the story. If he learned something worthwhile, he would pay the money back.

A few weeks later, the young man walked into my friend's kitchen put the money on the table and never said a word.

For the most part it has been a while since any of us have had the chance to be on our bikes. When you do get the chance, remember that your riding skills are a little rusty. You need to take some time practicing the skills that almost become second nature by the end of the riding season. Take some time at the beginning of our riding season to practice your turning, braking, and other skills before you head off on a ride.

> 'Skill' is often no more than CONFIDENCE By James R. Davis

Some time ago I was riding with a group down a back-country road when our group leader decided that we needed to perform our 'mandatory' U-turn. The road had two lanes (one in each direction) and there was no oncoming traffic.

With only one exception everybody made a 'three-point' maneuver. That is, we turned across the road and stopped when we could not keep going without running off the pavement, then backed up after turning the front wheel, stopped and turned the front wheel again and proceeded to complete the maneuver.

There was, as I said, one exception. This rider was on a relatively new GoldWing and he was carrying a passenger. Further, he is a BIG man well over 6' tall and well over 300 pounds. This man simply aggressively leaned his bike over and drove his bike through the entire 180 degree turn without needing to stop or running out of pavement.

The chatter on the CB was filled with compliments relative to his profound skill with his bike. Those compliments started again at our next rest stop. They were well deserved compliments. But they were misdirected. That is, what should have been complimented, in my opinion, was the rider's CONFIDENCE rather than his skill. Don't get me wrong - the man demonstrated lots of skill. He had demonstrated a mastery of his clutch, his throttle, and his HEAD!

With even modest skill almost anyone can lean a bike far enough in a slow-speed turn to drag a peg - but very few of us want to or would even try to get close to that big a lean because we do not KNOW that we can do it successfully. Why? Because we lack confidence in either our machine or ourselves. So, we compromise and do what we KNOW we can do - we make a three-point U-turn on a narrow road.

And how is it that this BIG man developed the confidence to make that slow-speed hard lean needed to complete his smooth U-turn? He had lots of experience. Experience gained from lots of practice.

Whether you call it skill or confidence, this man handles his bike very well indeed. He deserves recognition and regard, and he certainly gets both from me. Further, his U-turn maneuver took substantially less time than mine did. In other words, he was at risk for far less time than I was. THAT aspect of the value of experience never occurred to me before confidence can reduce time at risk.

So, schedule some time on a regular basis and go out and practice,

practice, practice. Earn the respect and regard of your friends by increasing your confidence/skills. Potentially reduce your at-risk time while on the road.

Practice increases confidence. Confidence shows as 'skill.' Over-confidence, however, can kill. The difference between the two, of course, is that being confident means you know you can do something, being over-confident means you think you can.

Making a U-turn like my friend did may not be the most important thing you will ever have to do, but failing to negotiate a curve at high speed because you lack confidence enough to lean the bike just a bit more is simply unacceptable motorcycling. PRACTICE, PRACTICE, PRACTICE

Rhode Island-1 is the host chapter for our next Annual **Red Knights Convention** for 2002 (August 22-25, 2002).

Rooms are blocked at the Sheraton Providence Airport Hotel in Warwick, Rhode Island (401-738-4000) and more rooms at the Comfort Inn Hotel (401-732-0470), just a stone's throw away from the convention hotel if overflow space is needed. Ask for the "Red Knights Motorcycle Club" rate at both hotels.

The Red Knights have what they call the "Run of the House" from August 22 - 24, 2001 at the Sheraton. We have reserved 70 rooms for Thursday (8/22) and 130 rooms for Friday and Saturday (8/23-24). The price for the rooms will be \$119.00 a night. (Just a side note that this hotel's group rates for this time of year are usually \$125 to \$159 a night).

The registration fee for this year's convention is \$80.00 per-person. With your registration fee you get the following amenities;

- "Goodie Bag" and Program Journal,
- 2002 Convention Pin,
- Hospitality Room, (which will be open except during any scheduled meeting),

Saturday Night Functions include Dinner (with choices of Roasted Chicken, London Broil Steak, or Boston Baked Scrod) and the awards ceremony with dancing afterwards!

A Sunday morning farewell executive breakfast buffet rounds out the convention.

Rhode Island-1 is also going to have a "REAL" New England style clam bake on Thursday. Price for this is \$25.00 perperson. This includes your choice of Lobster, Steak or Chicken with Red Clam Chowder and Clam Cakes, Steamed Clams, Steamed Mussels, and more!

There will also be a bike show on Saturday.

All rides at the convention will be posted on the R.I. webpage and you will receive a copy of all rides and times upon check-in at the Hotel. Together with our Friends!

There was an article in the November issue of *Motorcvcle Tour* and Cruiser that really hit the nail on the head when it came to talking about Americade. As Linda Stacy

What could be more All-American than 50,000 enthusiastic motorcyclists and motorcycle enthusiasts gathered at the beginning of summer, on the shores of a great lake, amidst the Adirondack Mountains? For we who attend this grand touring event every year, the name "Americade" evokes a Pavlovian sense of anticipation and afterwards, a case of year-long nostalgia for this week long immersion in motorcycling.

Monday, June 4 was an overcast day. Glowering at the gloomy skies I [the author] thought back to Americade 2000 (also known as the Great Flood) and wondered if we were in for it again.

After that first dreary day, the weather was a dream come true. Despite predictions of rain, rain, and rain, it was like Americade was blessed. Blue skies accented with fluffy, white clouds, clear nights, and cool, transparent mornings. Even at mid day, it was comfortably toasty. Looking around, I kept feeling I should pinch myself to check if I was really awake. It was that good.

[Some of the week's events mentioned in the article included] the Blue-black waters, woods of deep-green pine forests, hospitable hotels, motels, and cottages of Lake George and the Lake George Village; Boat cruises on the lake; the Tour-Expo full of vendors with motorcycle wares, services, accessories for everyone, and food; Roaring Brook Ranch with its seminars, competitions, and demo rides; Guided tours, Self-guided tours, Poker Runs, and riding the roads through the magnificent Adirondack Mountains; but even better than the weather [and all the events], was the core of what makes a rally like this truly special: the people.

Although the material presented and the faces change, Americade follows much the same traditions and patterns each vear. There's something to the familiarity that makes it feel like coming home.

This well-run rally continues to grow steadily. An estimated 50,000-plus came to play together beside Lake George.

Hats off to the staff members and volunteers who put so much effort into making the 2001 event a safe, fun time. After such a beautiful week [in 2001], what can they do to top it in 2002? I can't wait to see!

Mass-2 Fundraiser

Last year we decided to for-go our Poker Run (the Poker Run was always very weather dependant, and when we have bad weather a lot of hard work makes very little money for the club) and try a new fundraiser our 120 Club.

The 120 Club was very successful and we are running it again this year. Tickets will be out and available to buy and sell beginning at our February Pot Luck. A Weekend in Waterbury

We hope that you can join the Red Knights for a relaxing weekend in the hills of Vermont at our favorite Bed and Breakfast. Its name is the Grunberg Haus and it is located on Rt. 100 (which is a beautiful drive in itself) in Waterbury, Vermont. The ride and weekend are scheduled for June 28-30.

Step into the countryside and enjoy quiet relaxation in a mountainside Austrian chalet. Rooms are nicely decorated with antiques and conversation pieces. Awake to the savory smell of fresh baked breads and muffins. Wander along the trails through the maple and pine forest. Unwind in front of a crackling fire (if it's a cool evening) or under the stars in the bubbling warm water of the outdoor Jacuzzi. Mass-2 has rented the whole Inn, so it's Red Knights weekend!

This secluded area is centrally located and there are plenty of things to do including Ben and Jerry's Ice Cream, dozens of restaurants, shopping at outlet stores and much, much more.

A full breakfast is included both Saturday and Sunday. Breakfast features homemade breads, fresh fruit, and hearty main dishes. You will overlook the mountains while you are enjoying pumpkin streusel muffins, maple poached pears and ricotta stuffed French toast. Or sample omelets are made with freshly gathered eggs with Vermont cheese, served with a fresh fruit sundae and lemon bread baked from an heirloom recipe.

Lemonade and iced tea are served in the afternoon in the summer in the self- service BYOB pub or outside on the deck. You can also help feed the Inn's chickens any time of the year. Boards games are provided or bring your favorite.

Prices for the rooms range from \$81 per night with a shared bathroom to \$148 per night in a private cabin. Check with Peg on details, prices, and reserving space for this *sure to be great* weekend! The room rates are listed for 2 people in a room. For more than 2 people in a room, there will be a \$15 extra charge per person.

When setting this up we asked for the best deal they could give us. We were told that they usually don't give any discounts for less than 4 nights, but they would invent a special firefighter's discount of 10 per cent if we rent 10 rooms or more (the 10% off price is listed above). Also they normally only give out the "top secret" insider's guide to covered bridges and waterfalls to people who buy package deals, but they would be happy to make an exception in our case. The planned Saturday tour is about a three-hour drive (without stops) and makes a big loop around central Vermont. They told us it would be perfect for a motorcycle ride, plus they will let us know where to pick up the best sandwich fixings if we want to do a picnic. Sounds great but there is limited space so make your reservations early. Call Ed or Peg at 978-632-8230 or e-mail them to reserve your space. Let us know what type of room you prefer, but again it is first come, first serve.

Riding Time! It's been a long week at work and you have been looking forward to having a Saturday on the bike. But first, take a few minutes to inspect your trusty steed to make sure everything is a go.

One such *once-over* is the **T-CLOCK** Inspection. The T-CLOCK inspection is a system to inspect the overall condition of your motorcycle. It is recommended that this be done during / after cleaning and at a minimum once per week. Here are a few highlights of the T-Clock.

– Tires; Check Condition, Air Pressure, Spokes, Rims, Bearings, and Seals.

– Controls; Check Levers, Pivots, Cables, Routing, Hoses, and Throttle.

Lights & Electric; Check Battery, Vent tube, Lenses, Reflectors, Wiring, Routing, Headlamps, and Aim.

— Oil and Fluids ; Check Levels, Gear oil, Brake and Clutch reservoirs, Coolant and Radiator, Fuel, Oil, and any leaks.

 Chassis and Chain ; Look over Frame, Steering Head Bearings, Swing Arm Bushings, Suspension, Shocks, Chain/Belts, Sprockets, Fasteners, Cotter pins and clips.

Kickstand /Center stand; Look over condition, Retention, and Side stand.

This is just a brief outline of the T-Clock inspection. If you would like a detailed copy contact Bob Laford, or search for "T-Clock" on the internet. It is good practice to get into a routine of inspecting your bike to keep it in top performance and maximum safety for you and your rider.



<u>Group Riding</u>

Prior to any ride we try to host a "rider's meeting" with all the participants for the day's ride. We haven't been out on a group ride since our Polar Bear Ride in November, so it's always a good idea to review some of our ride components.

During the riders' meeting we:

- Review where we are going and what route we will be taking
- Review our staggered riding formation
- Describe how we handle lane changing and what to do if the group splits apart
- Specify which channel on the CB we will be using and that we all will use
- Demonstrate and explain each handsignal we use
- Determine the riding experience of everyone that is new to the group
- Invite all the riders to do a 'walk around' their bikes to insure all is in order and then to take a quick look at the bikes on either side of them for the same reason

As a result, there is no doubt who the Road Captain is and what his or her expectations are of the group. The "drag bike" or last bike in line is also identified.

If we have bikes without CB radios, we attempt to place them in between riders with radio communications. This is a way to ensure that communications from the lead bike can make it to all the riders.

This brief meeting helps make our group ride as safe is as can be — because we are all talking the same language after the meeting.

Information from the Massachusetts Motorcycle Association (www.mma-of-ma.com)

Back in October, Governor Swift announced that the Registry of Motor Vehicles has assumed the activities surrounding the Massachusetts Motorcycle Rider Education Program formerly administered by the Governor's Highway Safety Bureau. The program supports the availability of courses approved by the Motorcycle Safety Foundation (MSF) for both novice and experienced riders and also conducts public information activities on general motorcycle safety.

"I'm very pleased to bring these activities under the RMV umbrella," said Registrar of Motor Vehicles Daniel A. Grabauskas. "As we already conduct similar activities in a number of other programs, I am certain that we will have continued success in developing skilled riders and increasing the public's awareness of motorcycles on our roadways."

After the RMV took over this program, an audit of the *Motorcycle Safety Fund* books found more than \$285,000 in unspent money from previous years' collection from motorcyclists registration fees. \$2 from every bike registration in Massachusetts goes into this fund to be dedicated to motorcycle safety, awareness, and education programs.

posters and bumper stickers are in registry branches throughout the State. Also, the Registry has initiate taped messages on the Registry's telephone lines, motorcycle safety verbiage on the branch digital message boards, and is including motorcycle safety information in license renewals.

The Registry is also beginning a program this year proclaiming that "March is the beginning of Motorcycle Safety and Awareness Season.

These efforts, co-inspired by the MMA all help to keep motorcycles in the minds of drivers, helping to make motorcycling a safer mode of travel for everyone.

The Massachusetts Rider Education Program supports a statewide network of training sites that offer Motorcycle Safety Foundationapproved courses. These sites have served approximately 31,000 students from 1990 through 2000. There are approximately 250,000 licensed motorcyclists and 106,000 registered motorcycles in the Commonwealth.

As always, the Red Knights encourage all our members to participate in formal motorcycle rider education. It makes a difference!
