RK Mass-13 hosted the Fall meeting at the Ayer Fire Department on October 13. There were seven chapters and 34 members in attendance.

**Region-1** Director Don Moore was also in attendance and gave some insight to issues that the International Board has on going. He also told us that Massachusetts is a model for how chapters should work together within a state and if all his states operated as smoothly as Massachusetts, his job would be a lot easier. Don also stated that Facebook is becoming a bigger player in getting the Red Knight name out there—but that each chapter must have a business TMLA and the web page must be under control of the Chapter's Executive Board.

State Rep Colby reported that the RKMC booth at the New England Fire Chiefs show was a lot of fun and saw a lot of traffic. He thanked Steve Mickle (and others) for making this a success each year. George said he is looking forward to next year and hopes to see others step forward who may wish to spend some time at the booth.

Mike Davis spoke on his experiences on what can happen when things go wrong on a ride and how actions before, during, and after the event can help during the ensuing investigations and litigation. Mike stressed that documentation including pictures of the ride (and before the ride) can become evidence in the case.

Several other members spoke on the necessity for pre-ride meetings and having good control of rider conduct.

State Rep Colby reminded chapters that the International also has insurance policies available for purchase for events.



2013 Edition of the RK-Massachusetts T-Shirts

Interest was raised at the Fall Meeting to investigate "High-visibility" T-shirts with the Massachusetts Red Knights design. We are working on prices for both longsleeve and short sleeve shirts. We will soon be sending around a survey asking for numbers of how many members are interested in ordering for the 2013 riding season. Please take part in this questionnaire.



Membership dues payable to the International run from January 1st till December 31st of each year. A grace period for payment is granted from January 1st till February 15th. After that date dues are subject to a \$50.00 late payment fee. There are nine classifications of membership: Charter Member, Active Member, Associate Member, Social Member, Honorary Member, Member-at-Large, Life membership, Compassionate Honorary Member, and Junior Member. Refer to the International By-laws and SOGs if you have any questions about the different classifications. Dues for new members joining a chapter shall be \$16.00 per member in their first year of membership and will be pro-rated at the rate of 25% reduction in the third guarter and 50% reduction in the fourth guarter. Renewing member's dues shall be: Charter, Active or Associate Member \$13.00 • each Social or Honorary Member \$7.00 each Compassionate Honorary Member no charge Junior Member no charge Dues for chapters are to be sent in U.S. funds to the International Treasurer. Please be sure to include a current membership roster which has the members Name, Address, Zip or postal code, phone number including area code, and Email address if they have one. And lastly their membership status/classification. Dues may also be paid on-line using a major credit card but can only be done after a current membership roster has been received by the Treasurer who will then send a link to the chapter President or Treasurer for payment of dues on-line. 

A line of 250 motorcycles stretched for miles along a 58 mile, police escorted ride through Pennsylvania and Maryland towards the National Fire Academy during this year's convention. All had the opportunity to pay our respects at the Fallen Firefighter Memorial and the nearby 9-11 Memorial once on site. The keynote speaker for the ceremony was a woman who works for the foundation who had lost her son, a firefighter. She explained how she felt losing her son and also what the foundation does for families of fallen firefighters.

The ceremony also included the unveiling of the section of bricks on the memorial walkway that were dedicated by members of the Red Knights. Many chapters and members have had bricks placed in the walkway as we also did as the Massachusetts Red Knights.

#### Can you hear me now??

Probably a few years late, but this year I started to wear hearing protection when I am riding. My hearing has been diminishing a bit and as with any of us I have not been very kind to my hearing whether it was from concerts in the Centrum, music blaring in my car, 30 years of being a firefighter, or the wind noise from riding.

Even with a full face helmet, the experts say that the decibels created at highway speed excited what OSHA considers safe for us at work even in a very brief amount of time.

What I found when I started wearing the disposable plugs at the beginning of riding season was that I could still hear what was going on around me — actually even better. I can hear Diona in my headset, I can hear my engine, the horn, and the traffic around me. What the ear plugs cut out was the wind noise. And if I spent the day on the bike wearing ear pugs, I was not as mentally fatigued at the end of the day. Now that I have been riding with them for a while, something does not feel "right" if I ride off without putting them in. Just like any piece of protective equipment, from gloves, boots, or helmet. If we get into the habit of wearing them, it becomes part of our routine.

At Americade in June, there were several vendors for "custom" hearing protection. I kept going back to them asking questions and looking at their documentation, and I finally shelled out the money and sat to have a custom pair of ear plugs made. They use a polymer that forms to your

ear canal so that it fits your ear perfectly. That increases the amount of sound attenuation that is possible, makes them more comfortable to wear, and they won't fall out.

I endorse everyone investing in a pair of custom ear plugs. You will not regret it. Pricy? Not really. It was around \$55, and as the rep told me, "you'll lose one long before they wear out.

As Campus Safety Officer I go through about \$300 worth of disposable ear plugs for the people in my circle of responsibility each year. I am so impressed with these custom plugs that I have brought in a vendor to fit out a number of people as a "market trial" at the University.

Since there was no vendor in our area, I contacted my friend Doug Dupell at Leonard Opticians in Orange. Doug is a fellow rider, EMT, and retired firefighter as well. His company has been working in the hearing aid business for many years, and the way to make these ear plugs is very similar to how he makes ear casts for hearing aids. Doug has now taken on the E.A.R.inc brand of custom hearing protection in his store. (His business card is above).
