State Reports from the Region-1 meeting

Vermont — Meets quarterly and across the state. Some members are looking to go up to Maine for a weekend ride. Six chapters total. Chapter 2 is hosting a Paul's Ride, this will be the final one on, June 18th. Chapter 5 has a Jazzy's Ride (Poker Run) on July 9th in Woodsville VT.

Maine –Each chapter has their own event and charity and is doing well for themselves. Maine has a great thing going within each chapter and are looking forward to keeping up the work they are doing. Maine 8 is doing a very large donation to the children's hospital in memory of a member who passed away. That will happen June 12th 2022. Rep will work with others to set up a bid for Yankee Rally.

New Jersey – Rep raised a question on the spring and fall board meetings. Question will be answered by Regional Rep, when he have an answer and will report back. Rep reported there is possibly a chapter looking to bid to host Yankee Rally, but could not confirm at the time.

New York –44 chapters. New York holds 3 meetings a year, Spring, Summer and Fall. They also move around the state and it is working well for the state over the past few years. Frank passed out NY Coins to the other reps as gifts. Americade rides and events are planed. Please see Facebook for additional details. A NY chapter is looking at hosting Yankee Rally and will bid to host for next year, asked reps to support the bid.

New Hampshire – Thanks all for first in person meeting. Seven Chapters in the state and they are trying to handle things in house before it blows up and goes up the line. It is working well within the state. NH is looking at the possibility of hosting a Rally, but nothing is confirmed. Talked about happenings in state as far as rides and events. NH is looking at making a website for the state more news on that will be sent out.

Massachusetts – Meets spring and fall, and it works well for them. A 50/50 raffle is held at each meeting and has worked for years that way to keep the state afloat with funds. Rep spoke about sending emails and importance of keeping email accounts cleaned up, as State Rep. He sends all emails with a CC or BCC to Region 1 Director and encourages all representatives to do the same. Mass 2 is hosting a blessing of the bikes, Saturday May 21 with an ICE Cream Social. Homebased (Veterans support service) is the beneficiary. Reminder cost for the Hall is \$20 per person per night.

Yankee Rally (comments from the Regional Meeting)

- Chapters thinking of hosting that the start of a Yankee Rally should begin with a \$1,000 minimum bank account.
- Yankee brings in a new life in the state and chapters, giving each member a newly found life for the Club. It is an amazing thing to witness
- All reps supported Maine's plan to host a Yankee Rally.
 Also offered help if necessary.

One point of business at the meeting was the creation of the **Region One Mayday Fund**. This fund is to assist Region-1 members in times of need. It has been formed to support Red Knights members in good standing, who have been injured on duty, suffered personal injury accidents, or illness.

Funds will be raised by donations, sales of goods to chapters and members, raffles, or donations. Funds will be dispersed in pre-determined, set amounts of \$100 per application, to help and assist as many as possible whenever funds are available.

A committee will be formed, comprised of EACH Region-1 State President/ Representative with each state holding one vote with the Region One Director serving as Chairman and voting alternate in the case of a tie. (Details/information of the fund and application process is being shared).

This is the first such formal program and hope are that other regions will also begin this supportive measure.

The FIRST fundraiser for the Region 1 Mayday Fund is a Regional Coin!





Region one Coin 343 will be auctioned off at Yankee, proceeds will benefit the Mayday fund of Region One.

Shipping costs; up to 10 coins, \$10 shipping charge. Large orders will ship in flat rate boxes at \$20/each order

Online payment are currently NOT available. Coins may also be picked up and purchased in person at the upcoming 2022 Yankee Rally, as well as the convention in Johnstown PA.

600 coins were ordered (\$3750.00 total). The private loan will be paid off when the fund account reaches and maintains over \$1000.00 total. Proceeds of coin sales support the Mayday fund.

Spring 2022 State Meeting

Mass-1 was host to the Spring State meeting, held at the Boylston Town House. Refer to the detailed minutes distributed to your Chapter president for more details than the bullets that appear below.



- Founding Fathers' patches are still available through the Assistant State Rep. All proceeds go towards the principle on the Memorial House mortgage.
- Thirteen people have registered for the Founding Father's ride. (Texas and Ohio participants, most recently). 6 have completed the trek, and one participant had to ship his bike home after mid-ride challenges. Patch and Coin designs have been sent for production.
- Memorial name plates for deceased members now have to be ordered as a group because of set up costs for the vendor—as opposed of single name plates.
- The Tri-state Firefighters Meet is being held at Webster Lake (#10 Memorial Beach Drive in Webster) on May 15. Mass-4 has secured a vendor table so that the Red Knights have a presence and can give out information to other firefighters. Anyone is welcome to join them and enjoy the show. The event is free to the public.
- Mass-2 thanked all who attended the wake for long-time member Walter Roach. The body voted a donation of \$100 to be sent to the Alzheimer's Association in memory of our friend, Walter.

Sharing a success story for member participation...



During the 2021 riding season Mass-2 had the idea to start doing rides mid-week. The thought was that with members working shifts, and the number of retirees that all our chapters have, that weekday rides might be popular — And they were!

These were booked "Let's Play Hooky" and they would be announced several days in advance, after watching the forecast. Rides were on different days of the week, different times of the day, different reasons and destinations, etc.

Emails would broadcast the intent and welcome anyone—retirees, those on shift, and even those that didn't want to go to work that day. Rides usually had between six and a dozen riders, mostly Red Knights, sometimes friends, and by the end of the season, MA2 had an email list that included RK family from other chapters, looking for the next announced planned hooky day.

Chapter email address and 2022 Voting – The International Board has set up RKMC email addresses for each chapter under "redknightsmc.com" If you need assistance with your official chapter email contact your state rep for guidance.

For 2022, the positions that we are voting for in Massachusetts are International Vice-President and Secretary

Nominations will close on May 22 and that is when we will know what contests must be decided by electronic ballot for our chapters in Region 1.

If you are an Active Member of the Red Knights International Motorcycle Club, who have previously served a Chapter or Association as President or Vice President or as a State or Provincial Representative for a minimum of one term, you may serve on the International Executive Board.

To be placed on the ballot a qualified member must be nominated by the President or Vice President of two Chapters. A Member-at-Large may be nominated for any position on the International Executive Board having received a majority vote of the International Executive Board.

If you, or the person whom you are nominating suit the requirements for nomination, you may fill out the nomination. The Nominee must complete the Nomination Profile prior to close of nominations and provide a photo. How To Check For Signs Of Wear In Your Motorcycle Tires

[No matter what you are riding], you should always be wary of the condition of your tires.

Tires are made from a mixture of rubber and synthetic compounds, and friction causes them to wear.

There are signs that will tell you that your motorcycle tires are worn out. You'll want to carefully examine them frequently to spot these signs.

Check The Tread Wear Indicator

All motorcycle tires have tread wear indicators. Tread wear indicators are often marked with "TWI" or a triangle shape on the side of the tire.

The tread wear indicator is designed to become flush (or level) with the tire surface once the tire is nearing its serviceable life. Once the tread wear indicator is level with the tire surface it's time to replace your tires with new ones.

Check For Signs Of Unusual Wear

We always want the tread wear pattern of our motorcycle tires to be perfectly worn out around the entire tire, but that will only happen in a perfect world.

Check your tires for the following wear pattern issues: Additional wear on one or both edges or in the center of the tire; Front tire has increased wear as compared to the rear tire; There are tears; bulges, punctures, cuts, cupping or unusual indentations; or if there is wear on a single side only.

You also have to take note of the inflation of your tires. Keep in mind that underinflation can cause your tire to wear out quickly.

Know The Age Of Your Tires

Most motorcycle tires have a lifespan of around five years. Look for a 4-digit code usually found on the sidewall of your tire. This will tell you the manufacturer date. The first two digits represent the week of the year the tire was made and the last two digits represent the year it was made.

Worn-out tires are more prone to failure. Learn how to spot the signs of wear in your tires and do your inspection on a regular basis, and you'll increase your safety and riding enjoyment.

2022 RKMC International Convention Celebrating the RKMC's 40th Anniversary!

The 2022 Convention is being hosted by PA22 in Johnstown, PA on **August 18-21, 2022**. Multiple hotels with 500 rooms are available with shuttle services to the host hotel.

It is expected to be one of the largest conventions in the history of the club. First because it is the 40th anniversary of the Red Knights, and second, it has been three long years since we gathered at a convention.

Dave "Moose" Rykala, Convention Chairperson for PA -22 states, "We're a small town, so we can't deliver the big town atmosphere. What we can and will do is provide everyone with small town hospitality and a memorable convention in the rolling hills and valleys of Western PA."

Johnstown is a walkable community, and there will also be shuttles to the arena where the Saturday banquet will be held. (The movie Slapshot was filmed in this arena and there is a display about the movie).


Four separate rides are scheduled to the Flight 93 Memorial in nearby Shanksville, PA. The "early bird" ride for those on Wednesday will also offer stops at the Shanksville FD, the first responding FD to the 9-11 crash and to the Flight 93 Memorial Chapel.

Separate rides will be offered to the:

- (1) Quecreek Mine rescue site, when nine miners were trapped underground for over 77 hours, from July 24 to 28, 2002. All nine miners were rescued; and
- (2) to the Johnstown Flood site, where over 2,200 people died when the Southfork Dam failed, flooding the valley downstream. This was the largest civilian loss of life disaster in the U.S. prior to 9-11.

Staples of the convention including Hospitality Room, Welcome BBQ, and Farewell Breakfast are also part of the itinerary.




HISTORY OF MOTORCYCLE HELMETS

The motorcycle helmet that we wear has its own rich history that started almost 80 years ago. The helmet is the most important gear that helps keep us alive. However, helmets have their own history, tracing back to the development from vintage leather skullcap era, to the modern-day carbon fiber and Kevlar masterpieces.

In the early 1900s when the first motorcycles came into the picture, they were merely "motorized bicycles", built for convenient transport and the need for any head protection was unheard of. But soon enough, motorcycles became faster and were used in racing. As a result, many riders faced injuries. It was first in 1914, that a British physician Dr. Eric Gardner commissioned a shellacked canvas to protect a rider's head. Dr. Gardner pushed for its use in the

Isle of Man TT, the premier motorcycle race of the day. This introduction saw a dramatic decrease in head concussions amongst racers as well.

But even this success, did not make the civilians excited. They felt 'odd' to wear a shell on their head while riding. Even then, as it is now, people wanted to look good while riding and so, the most they would opt for is padded leather caps.



They made the riders look good and the riders felt it was enough protection. The maximum that a rider would choose to protect himself was a skullcap and goggles. But everything changed when the famous national hero of Britain, T.E. Lawrence, aka 'Lawrence of Arabia' died tragically, not in any war or military campaign but in a road accident some miles from his home. This tragic turn of events made the public realize the dangers of motorcycle riding and how to prevent further accidents.

Dr. Hugh Cairns, the British physician who attended Lawrence at the hospital, was deeply moved by this tragic event and began research about the correlation between motorcycle accidents and head injuries. He was the first doctor to publish a report on this subject at the British medical journal. His research helped him aggressively promote helmets for the British Army. As during those days, motorcycle mounted 'dispatch riders' were widely used for reconnaissance and communication. Dr. Cairns' effort made the Army issue an order for all its military riders to wear helmets made of rubber and cork.

Over the next decades, as motorcycles became faster, still the civilians did not fondly adopt helmets. The basic helmets found in that time were simple half shells with leather straps providing minimal protection. However, in 1953, a revolutionary invention propelled helmets into its importance today. But a big development came in 1953, when C.F. Lombard, a professor of USC, developed a helmet that actually absorbed impact. This innovative helmet had three layers, with a hard fiberglass outer shell, impact-absorbing foam in the middle layer and a padded inner liner for comfort.

Roy Richter, former race car driver and founder of Bell Helmets picked up Lombard's design and created the Bell 500 model. He made sure he used the safety principles prescribed and based his designs on the aviation helmets of the day. As a result, Bell 500 was an instant success marking the beginning of an era of modern motorcycle helmets. It soon became a standard



equipment for racing and slowly, by the 1960s, more and more civilians began to use helmets. In 1963, Bell revolutionized the market with its first full-face motorcycle helmets called the Bell Star. It was expensive but offered the maximum protection using the technology and materials found in the U.S. military's and NASA's astronaut's flight helmets.

The Star was launched in the right time. The next year, at 1964, the USDOT created the first-ever safety standards by which motorcycle helmets must adhere to. Also in 1966, Congress passed the US Highway Safety Act which specified that states would be required to have helmet laws to get funds from the federal government for highway development. Slowly, the various states complied with 47 helmet laws in the next year. However, by 1968 many states repealed the law but helmets had become too popular and were common amongst riders. By 1970s and 1980s, full faced helmets came with even more modification with flip-up and tinted visors and the introduction of modular helmets that combined the convenience of an Open Face helmet with a Full face helmet.

Paris Moves To Ban Motorcycles

Proposals [to ban motorcycles] have been floated in certain UK counties as well as parts of the European mainland and even some cities in the United States.

News has come out of Paris, France where there's a serious push to get all internal combustion engine motorcycles and scooters off the roads entirely. That's right, not just stop selling them but to make driving them anywhere in the city limits illegal.

This fight isn't about how much carbon spews out of the tailpipes of motorcycles, which is probably what you're assuming. Instead, it's all about noise pollution. That's right, Parisians are sick of their city being loud. Instead of realizing that's what you get by packing so many people into tight spaces, they've decided to blame motorcycles and scooters for their woes.

A noise plan for the City of Paris was presented last October, with 30 actions proposed by city administration. However, an initiative sought to collect ideas from regular citizens. One proposal which gained a lot of support was the banning of internal combustion engine motorcycles since all-electric models produce little to no noise.

The author of this proposal is quoted by the local news as saying, "Outright banning thermal PTWs is therefore a commonsense solution to solve the number 1 source of noise pollution in Paris." A total of 944 voted for this proposal and 307 voted against it.

Already, Paris authorities have been experimenting with sound radars as a way to fight excessive noise pollution in the city. Such devices allow police to pinpoint which motorcycle is emitting more decibels than is allowed, then fine the rider. The claim is that noise pollution is leading to serious health and economic consequences.

If you think the claim of health consequences is ridiculous, you're not the only one. The European Environment Agency says 16,600 "premature deaths" in Europe are caused by noise pollution as well as 72,000 hospitalizations. Yes, everything is a health crisis these days.

While all-electric motorcycles might make some noise, I have yet to hear one that duplicates the Screaming Eagle wail.

Reinforcing the argument for banning motorcycles and scooters from Paris is the supposedly inevitability of all internal combustion engine cars also being banned. This is, of course, to fight the health crisis known as noise pollution and not global warming, global cooling, climate change, or whatever the term is this week.

Do you trust your GPS?

Alternate routes offered by apps like Google Maps and Waze don't always take into account hazards to drivers.

The road once carried stagecoaches during the Gold Rush, twisting its way through what is now a national forest and an area of the Sierra Nevada known for snowmobiling. In the winter, the rugged passage, known as the Quincy-La Porte Road or County Road 511 in Plumas County, Calif., is closed.

But Wendy Becktold, an editor from the Bay Area who was on her way to visit an ailing relative in Reno, Nev., on the Monday after Christmas, when Google Maps guided her to that route because two major highways were closed because of heavy snow.

In Washoe County, Nev., which includes Reno, a family of five from Southern California was

stranded for two hours on Monday night when their rented pickup truck got stuck in the snow on a two-lane dirt road, after the family sought an alternate route [via their map app] on the way to visit relatives for the holidays during the storm.

Record breaking snow is northern California dumped more than 17 feet of snow during December. The storm also closed Highway 50 for about 50 miles in the Sacramento Valley and the a portion of Route 81 because of the snow.

In a public warning, the Washoe County Sheriff's Office said that drivers had frequently taken the same detour when using GPS. From November 2020 to last February, emergency responders were called to 11 rescues, according to the sheriff.

Raquel Borrayo, a spokeswoman for Caltrans, California's state transportation department stated, "When people try to use mapping apps like Waze or Google Maps to avoid highway closures, they can sometimes be put in very precarious and dangerous situations with unplowed roads/dirt roads, heavy amounts of snow and zero cellphone

service."

During the Christmas week's storm, several people posted screen shots on Twitter of Google Maps and Waze directions sending users to the Henness Pass Road, which the Sierra County Historical Society describes as a secluded and winding mountain road that rises to an elevation of 6,920 feet. The road, a primary emigrant trail from Virginia City, Nev., is "left off many maps,"

according to a description on the historical society's website.

The Donner Pass, named for the doomed snowbound pioneer family, some of whom resorted to cannibalism during the 1840s, is about 40 miles from the detour.

Crystal A. Kolden, a geographer and disaster scientist who teaches at the University of California, Merced, said [these alternate routes are] barely drivable in the summer,"

The patch design was chosen and announced just prior to the new year and headed off to production shortly afterwards. Red Knight products with this logo, including the patch itself, is expected to be for sale online and at all the rallies and at the convention.

The rest of the story...

In August 2021 Norm Beausoleil mentioned on Facebook that as a club we were approaching 40 years (in 2022).

The question was asked if there was going to be an anniversary patch to mark the milestone.

With that thought, Norm approached the RKIFMC board and the Founding Fathers about the idea. That leadership decided to have a patch design contest, and information on how to submit entries was shared across social media to the members.

The contest concluded on November 30th, 2021. The entries were delivered to the Founding Fathers at their meeting in December to choose the winner.

Did you know your motorcycle helmet has an expiration date?

(Excerpts from Jonathan Klein's article in "The Drive" newsletter)

Yep, like milk and cheese, your motorcycle helmet comes with an expiration date.

Yet while milk and cheese, outwardly show expressions of their expiration, your helmet does not. It's up to you to both know what to look for, how to check it, what can cause it to prematurely expire, and what to do when it expires.

While the outward appearance of a helmet is one of solid and sturdy and something that won't degrade over time, it's the inner portion that can. Specifically, I'm talking about the part that's under the outer carbon kevlar or plastic shell and over the plush liner: the expanded polystyrene (EPS) foam.

This piece of a helmet's construction is to provide impact absorption in the case of an accident, fall, or crash. However, because of its makeup, heat, sweat, time, and other factors, it can begin to degrade the

foam's density and cause it to lose its effectiveness over time. There are other factors that can cause the EPS liner to expire, chief among them a crash, fall, or accident.

The Average Expiration Date of a Motorcycle Helmet is between five and seven years, which gives you a lot of use. And for comparison's sake, how many things in your house have a five- to seven-year lifespan? Not many, as we have chosen conspicuous consumption over lifetime service.

That said, expiration dates range from manufacturer to manufacturer. Here's a quick guide to most of the top manufacturers and each's respective expiration dates.

Icon: 3-5 years

Alpinestars: 5 years

HJC: 3-5 years

AGV: 7 years

Schuberth: 5-7 years

Shoei: 5 years

Fox: 5 years

Fly: 5 years

Klim: 5 years

Arai: 7 years

Bell: 3 years

Where Do You Find the Date of Manufacture? Grab your nearest lid and turn it upside down so that the inner portion is facing you. On one of the chin straps or under the padding near your ears, should be a tag that tells you the date of manufacture. From there, peep the list above for the expiration duration and see if your helmet is still up to standards.



How old is YOUR helmet? If you cannot remember when you purchased it — or if you proudly boast that when you purchased your helmet you had different hair color (or had hair) it is probably time to replace that lid.

You wouldn't (or shouldn't) feel safe if you were running twenty year old tires on your motorcycle, then you are equally unsafe with leaving the protection of your head to a 20 year

old helmet that has been baked in the sun and your grime and grit for 20 years.

And just think of the technological changes in helmet construction that has occurred since the last time you purchased a helmet!
