

Know before you go

<u>The pre-ride inspection</u>. Sure we love to ride, and we're often in a hurry, but it takes only a moment to perform a pre-ride check. Here are some quick checks to perform daily, and others on a weekly basis.

DAILY

- Fuel supply: That it is adequate, and that the petcock(s) are turned on.
- Engine oil supply: That it is adequate for proper lubrication according to your dip stick or oil sight glass.
- Inflation of both tires: Use an accurate gauge to check that inflation is within the range stated in your owner's manual, but does not exceed the maximum pressure listed on the tires' sidewalls. Always check inflation when the tires are cold.
- Brake master cylinder: Check the fluid level via the see-through sight.
- Clutch master cylinder: Check fluid level.
- Headlight, taillight, brake light, turn signals, horn: Check operation

WEEKLY

- Battery level: Check electrolyte level in each cell; add distilled water if necessary. Check terminals for corrosion; clean if necessary. While on tour, carry an old shampoo bottle with a tight-sealing lift-up top that forms a narrow spout; it is perfect for shooting water into the battery.
- Clutch adjustment: Check per owner's manual, and adjust if necessary.
- Wheels, including spokes if so equipped:
 Notice if wheels are out of round or damaged.
- Drive Chain: Adjust and/or lube according to owners manual (if so equipped).
- Cables: Check for fraying and broken housings. Lubricate when needed, and replace when necessary – before they break!

Here are a few details on events that appear in your ride schedule:

- March 22. Take the Train into Boston. Meet at the Fitchburg Train Station for 9:00 a.m. and we'll head off for some walking, eating, and a lot of laughs.
- May 2. Meet up to head off to the Cape. Meet at Burger King in the K-Mart Plaza in Fitchburg for 9:00 a.m. and we'll have a great time riding the shore with friends from all over New England.
- May 18. Ride to Wright's Chicken Farm in Rhode Island for dinner. Meet at the Westminster Fire Station at 10:30 a.m. with your appetite! (Last year's May Ride was cancelled because of about 6 inches of snow. So keep those snow chains ready).

Several years ago Fred and Lisa Leblanc and Bob and Diona Laford were on a ride out through parts of western Massachusetts. It

was a great summer's day and they were cruising along *Route 66* west of Northampton when they came across some road construction. Nothing too serious at first, just a little work on the side of the road... then the pavement ended... then it turned to drainage rock... and then it turned to sand... and then it turned to mud! We never came across any road crews and warning signs until we were in the sand and the mud sweating profusely as we mired through the construction site worried about our riding partners and our bikes!

Occasionally we all run out of pavement and we must ride on less than perfect roads. That happens to be what a section of Ron Ayers' book <u>Going the Extra Mile</u> covers, and I thought I would share some of that with you.

What are the keys to staying upright when things beneath your tires become a bit sloppy?

First, until you gain some experience and confidence riding off-road, ride very cautiously. Traction is unpredictable in the dirt and if you become overconfident after riding through some tightly packed dirt, you may be taken by surprise when the surface changes.

A second tip is to loosen up on the controls. Don't grasp the handlebars in a death grip when the going gets tough. A moving motorcycle will tend to stay up by itself. Stay relaxed.

Reduce your speed and shift your weight to your foot pegs. Standing transfers your weight to the foot pegs, thus lowering your center of gravity and making it easier for you to control the bike.

It's also a good idea to use a mid-range gear when you are riding on unpaved surfaces. By keeping the motorcycle's RPMs a little higher, you can use the braking power of the engine to slow down rather than relying on the brakes, which is more likely to result in a skid.

If you encounter a short patch of sand, keep moving and open the throttle a little to shift some weight to the rear of the motorcycle to prevent the front wheel from digging in. Riding through extended areas of sand or very deep sand is a different matter. In this case your best alternative may be to slow down and paddle your bike through at less than a snail's pace. Shallow patches of gravel usually aren't difficult to deal with, but if the gravel is deep, the technique will be similar to riding in sand.

If you encounter a muddy patch pick one muddy rut and stay with it. If you're comfortable standing up, try to make it through that way, slow and easy, without making abrupt changes to the accelerator or the brakes.

These tips won't make you an expert off-road rider, but if you observe the pointers and take it easy you'll find it a lot easier to stay upright as you negotiate the occasional bad patch.

The Apple Hill Farm was a really nice place to have our Winter Pot-luck this month — and thanks to Donna Moreau and Bob Shakarian for being our hosts.

We were glad that a number of our members were able to attend (over 30) — and the day was spent talking about rides past and rides to come!

Make sure you take the Ride Schedule that you received (either at the dinner or in this mailing) and post it in a conspicuous place so you see what's going on with the Chapter during the year.

We hope to see everyone on the road sometime during the year.

The officers (and their spouses) tried to plan a varied assortment of rides, distances, destinations, and days for the different rides so that everyone has an opportunity to join us.

As you can see on your schedule, there are also several rides where we are planning on riding to other chapters' events to support them as well.

If you know of rides and destinations that you would like to see the chapter go on — please let the officers know so we can incorporate your ideas as well.

Important April Meeting with proposed bylaw changes!

Our April business meeting is scheduled for Sunday, April 12, and will be at the Laford's at 276 West Road in Petersham. It will be a pot-luck get-together with a business meeting. Some very important bylaw changes will be discussed and voted on at that time. At the International Convention in August, International Bylaws were altered to allow the chapters to decide if they would be a "Red Vest Only" chapter or if other colors would be allowed for vests that bear the RKMC Crest.

This decision was tabled from the November meeting because those present thought that the vest color issue is one of significant importance and should not be decided at a meeting with only a few members present. Think about the issue: Should Mass-2 remain a Red Vest chapter or should that be changed so members can place the club crest on other colors or vest designs? If you have an opinion you would like to voice, please be at the April chapter meeting.

Proposed Bylaw Changes – to be voted on at April 12, 2003 meeting.

To insert one of the following text options to Article 10 Section 4 of the Chapter Bylaws:

OPTION 1:

Section 4: Chapter Uniform. The uniform for the Chapter shall be a white uniform shirt and navy blue or black uniform pants with black shoes or boots. The International patch, chapter rocker, and membership rocker shall be worn on the left sleeve. The member may wear the flag of the United States on the right sleeve. The front of the shirt may have nametags and rank insignias of the individual wearing it. All other markings are to be in good taste and consistent with the image of the Red Knights.

Chapter Jackets. The club jacket of the Chapter shall be a baseball type jacket, red in color. The member may affix the International patch, chapter rocker, and membership rocker on the left sleeve, and the flag of the United States on the right sleeve if he or she so chooses. The back of the jacket, when marked, shall say "Red Knights Motorcycle Club Mass. Chapter 2."

Chapter Vests. Chapter Members wearing Vests bearing the emblem of the Red Knights Motorcycle Club **shall be limited to vests that are red in color**. The back of the vest may contain The Official International Emblem of the Red Knights Motorcycle Club with a top rocker showing membership status, and a bottom rocker that states "Mass. Chapter 2" may be also worn. (Another option that is available for a top rocker is one that says "Red Knight").

OPTION 2:

Section 4: Chapter Uniform. The uniform for the Chapter shall be a white uniform shirt and navy blue or black uniform pants with black shoes or boots. The International patch, chapter rocker, and membership rocker shall be worn on the left sleeve. The member may wear the flag of the United States on the right sleeve. The front of the shirt may have nametags and rank insignias of the individual wearing it. All other markings are to be in good taste and consistent with the image of the Red Knights.

Chapter Jackets. The club jacket of the Chapter shall be a baseball type jacket, red in color. The member may affix the International patch, chapter rocker, and membership rocker on the left sleeve, and the flag of the United States on the right sleeve if he or she so chooses. The back of the jacket, when marked, shall say "Red Knights Motorcycle Club Mass. Chapter 2."

Chapter Vests. Chapter Members wearing Vests bearing the emblem of the Red Knights Motorcycle Club **shall be limited to vests that are red or black in color**. The back of the vest may contain The Official International Emblem of the Red Knights Motorcycle Club with a top rocker showing membership status, and a bottom rocker that states "Mass. Chapter 2" may be also worn. (Another option that is available for a top rocker is one that says "Red Knight").
